Rich Osborne brings strong views to job as VASJ's new President

In the late 1960s, young Richard Osborne's numerous extracurricular activities as a student at St. Joseph High School included responsibility for writing the weekly "Viking Views" column for the local community newspapers, the Euclid News-Journal and the Collinwood Scoop.

As things turned out, that task proved to be a stepping stone to a distinguished career in journalism and publishing. Now, Osborne is retracing his steps--but in the opposite direction.

A member of the 1969 St. Joe graduating class, he is retiring from the publishing business, where he most recently served as editor and publisher of the award-winning Ohio Magazine, to become the new President at Villa Angela-St. Joseph High. (The president oversees the financial and operational side of the school, while the principal is primarily concerned with the academic environment.)

Osborne, 60, officially started in his new position on July 25, replacing Brian Menard who held the post for the past two years. capacity as the school's president is to write at least one more "Viking Views" column for the local community newspapers. His message, no doubt, will emphasize his confidence in the East 185th St. school's prospects for the future.

"I object to the feeling among some graduates that it just isn't the same anymore with the merged school. That simply isn't true," he stressed in an exchange with the Observer. "Sure, the personality of the school may be different. We may not have 2,200 boys roaming the halls and we are not an all-girls school in a castle on the lake, but the character of VASJ is precisely the same as it always was at VA and SJ.

"I wish more alums would stop by for a visit and spend a little time walking the halls, talking to students and teachers, and seeing the kids in action in class. They are amazing. And the spirit that made so many of us so loyal for so long is alive and well and flourishing."

Osborne says that one of his major goals as president will be to "introduce or re-introduce grads and the wider community to the school. I want to raise our public profile so everyone knows about the great things happening here. Believe me, I know there are naysayers and doomsayers out there, but they are just plain wrong. We're on a strong and steady course into the future." During a journalism career that included executive positions at Cleveland Magazine, The (Lorain) Journal, and Industry Week magazine, Osborne gained wide respect in the publishing industry. A two-term past president of the Press Club of Cleveland, he was inducted into the Cleveland Journalism Hall of Fame in 2007.

An area native who grew up in Euclid and North Collinwood (he attended both Holy Cross and St. Jerome grade schools), Osborne has been a steadfast supporter of St. Joseph and VASJ for many years and served as chairman of the school's Board of Advisors from 2009 to 2011.

As you can see, the \$198 Million Euclid Creek Tunnel Project has begun in earnest in the Ward 11 community. There are several sites in the neighborhood where construction is already underway; those being on the north side of Lakeshore Boulevard at the Easterly Waste Water Treatment Plant at East 140th, Triangle Park at East 174th Street and Lakeshore Boulevard and soon to be the northwest corner of Nottingham Road and St. Clair Avenue. One future construction site will be at the northern end of East 156 Street in Beulah Park.

At each of these sites a vertical shaft will be drilled to a depth of approximately 200' for ventilation and equipment access for the underground tunnel which will link the storm sewers in the neighborhood from St Clair Avenue underground to the staging site in the Village of Bratenahl, south of I-90. You can see this massive site as you are driving the East Shoreway, east bound just past Eddy Road and before the Lakeshore Boulevard exit. This is the main construction site where the tunnel boring machine will be assembled and eventually begin to carve out the immense 18,000 foot long / 24 foot diameter underground tunnel, which is intended to capture and hold 50 million gallons of heavily polluted and combined storm and waste water, referred to as Combined Sewer Overflow (CSO's), which will be treated and then released at the Easterly Waste Water Treatment Plant.

As we have all heard from the Project Manager, Northeast Ohio Regional Sewer District (NEORSD), this tunnel is intended to substantially clean up storm water that is entering Euclid Creek as well as at Wildwood, Villa Angela and Euclid Beach Lakefront State Parks. This project has been a long time coming and is very important to the overall health and development of our community. Stay tuned for future construction updates.

Another much anticipated project is 80% complete; that being the new Collinwood Recreation Center on Lakeshore Boulevard. The grand opening date has not been set as of this writing but I can assure you that once we have a date – we will make sure that everyone is notified of that special day! You won't be disappointed by this state-of-the-art, LEED certified, facility right here in Ward 11.

Furthermore, I want to congratulate Northeast Shores Development Corporation (NSDC) on being the recipient of a \$500,000 grant from the Community Partnership for the Arts Commission (CPAC). This grant will help to provide micro-loans and implement a marketing campaign to attract resident artists to our ward to assist them in purchasing or rehabbing homes and commercial buildings which will strengthen the entire concept of the Waterloo Road Arts and Entertainment District. We look forward to our arts community growing in size and importance.

I encourage all of our residents to become a stakeholder in our ward and become involved in both our local Development Corporations. Please continue to turn in properties with high grass and weeds to (216) 664-2300, housing violations to (216) 664-2007 and chuckholes / road repairs to (216) 664-2510.

Have a safe summer. Please pay special attention to what is going-on on your street and in your neighborhood. Informed citizens make for a better and safer community!

CODE ENFORCEMENT PARTNERSHIP MOVING AS EXPECTED

In last month's Observer, there was a recap of the City of Cleveland's Code Enforcement partnership that is taking place Citywide. Because of the rising number of Building and Housing Code violations within the City of Cleveland, Cleveland City Council last year voted on a co-operation of the Building and Housing (B&H) department and all the Community Development Corporations (CDC) within the City. The CDC's are to go out and visually inspect the outside of homes within a specified area (concentrated inspection area/

also requires a knowledge of the building and housing department as well as municipal housing court for potential and/or existing violations on properties. The usual computer skills are a must, as well as the ability to multi task and work without constant supervision. Position also includes screening potential tenants for commercial and residential properties as well as managing leases for houses and/or apartments and oversee general maintenance as necessary. CIA), one at a time. The owner is then to be contacted regarding any and all violations observed by the code enforcement officer for the ward. The owner is to be given 30 days to correct whatever violations or potential violations were observed. If the violations are not corrected within the 30 day time period, and the CDC is not informed as to progress/intent by the property owner, the house is then turned into B&H for a formal inspection, ticketing and potential housing court appearance.

Over 100 letters have gone out to homeowners within the Collinwood areas that have so far been inspected, telling them what violations need to be corrected on their homes before B&H Department comes out to formally site them. We have been getting a lot of response back from home owners looking for assistance and acknowledging the problems existing on their properties.

This is what the program is all about. Communication between property owners, the local CDC as well as B&H and the Councilmen. Trying to get things done before it gets to the point that it ends up a legal battle is why City Council voted for this partnership in the first place. It is going to take a while to see dramatic changes, but this is a good start. Ward 11 has always had a solid residential base and this partnership is only going to make it better.

"If You Build It, He Will Come!" III AKA Flowers Are Meant To Be In Flower Beds

Hello Collinwood Family,

Last month's article focused on the rich history, tapestry as well as diversity of our Collinwood community and encouraged neighborly efforts toward recycling together with proper trash disposal for ourselves and our neighbors. This month's article was inspired by my wife who recently while driving towards our home mentioned how lovely the tiny white "flowers" looked on many of the lawns in our neighborhood. I told my wife that: "those are not flowers honey, but weeds." Now, though I gest, many don't realize that only flowers are meant to be in flower beds not lawns. And, though our lawns can be arrayed in the beautiful colors of white, yellow and even lavender, these weeds by there very definition are plants that are "out of place". As one article states and I quote: "Some plants are not sown. They come up anywhere in the garden or lawn. They look as if they are out of place since they are not planted with any intention. The result - they completely ruin your gardening and farming efforts and the landscape theme adopted. Qualities of such plants called weeds have not yet been established by the book, but they are categorized as pernicious, thus hampering activity of humans. They grow at pace and space that is not welcome, and hence have to be removed and discarded. They have a number of features that are not desirable at all.

These undesirable plants keep spreading widely all over the garden space and can adapt to all weather conditions. The sad part is that they disperse a lot of seeds. For quite a long time, the seeds remain dormant but then, they grow quick and cover a lot of space, especially when the weather conditions favor them. Due to this growth, the rest of the plants in the garden or lawn get impacted negatively. These 'random' plants take up a lot of space; absorb a lot of water, light as well as nutrients from the soil. They keep popping up in all the empty garden spaces year after year, providing no special benefits to the landscaping."1

Lawn weeds may conveniently be divided into two classes based on the way in which they emerge from the seed. Monocots emerge with a single seed leaf whereas dicots emerge with two seed leaves. Most monocot weeds found in turfgrass are from the family Gramineae and are termed weedy grasses. Examples include crabgrass, annual bluegrass, tall fescue, and quackgrass. Dicots, on the other hand,

are termed broadleaf weeds and include such plants as dandelion, clover, ground ivy, knotweed, and plantain.2

The most effective method of controlling lawn weeds is to maintain a dense and vigorously growing turf cover. Weeds are often an indication of problems in the grass plant environment, and killing the weeds without correcting the underlying problem will lead to unsatisfactory results. For example, a problem with knotweed is usually an indication of severe soil compaction. Control of knotweed without correction of the soil compaction will only lead to sparse soil cover until the area is again invaded by weeds that grow in compacted soil.

Often turf weeds can be controlled simply by altering the cultural practices to favor the grass plants rather

than the weeds. The cultural controls may include raising (or lowering) the mowing height, changing the frequency of mowing, lengthening (or shortening) the period between irrigations, increasing (or decreasing) the application of fertilizer, or aerifying the soil.

A combination of proper cultural practices plus prudent use of chemical is sometimes necessary to control weeds effectively in turf. Whenever herbicides are used, container labels should ALWAYS be read and followed carefully.3

So remember family only Flowers are truly meant to be in Flower Beds. Until Next Time Happy Planting Collinwood Family.

One St. Joe grad who was delighted to hear that Osborne had been chosen for the VASJ post is Tim Ryan ('61), a professional photographer who offered to provide the photos that accompany this article.

"The Vikings are lucky," Ryan said. "There is no candidate more worthy. Rich is a home-grown fan of the school." Ryan, a member of the VASJ Hall of Fame, has served with Osborne on the Hall of Fame selections committee.

While a student at St. Joe's, Osborne served as editor of the school's literary magazine, as an editor for the school newspaper, a class officer, and as vice president of the Student Council. After graduating in 1969, he earned a bachelor's degree in fine arts at the University of Cincinnati in 1973.

Since 2001, Osborne has been a publisher with Great Lakes Publishing Co. and editor of Ohio Magazine, which he led to numerous awards, including recognition by the Society of Professional Journalists as the state's best monthly publication. Prior to that, his career included service as the founding editor ofInside Business magazine and as acting editor of Cleveland Magazine.

From 1996 to 2002, Osborne was a project director, speaker, and editor with Industry Week, the Cleveland-based national magazine. There, he oversaw various special projects, including development of the IW 1000, a ranking of the world's largest publicly held manufacturing companies, and the "World's Best-Managed Companies," a global

honor roll of managerial excellence.

Earlier in his career, he served as a columnist and associate editor with The Journal, a daily newspaper in Lorain, and as managing editor at Cleveland Magazine, executive editor of the Southbridge Evening News, a daily newspaper in Massachusetts, and as publisher and editor of Corporate Clevelandmagazine.

As president of The Osborne Group since 1994, he has managed publishing projects for regional and national clients, including The Plain Dealer, Business Week, the Pittsburgh Post-Gazette, and Case Western Reserve University. He is the author of A Community of Faith (1998), a commemorative publication for the Diocese of Cleveland, and also Cleveland-Cliffs (1997), a history of the international iron-ore company.

Well-known for his knack for providing insightful analysis, Osborne has been in demand as a guest panelist on local radio and television programs discussing topics of regional and statewide interest.

Currently a lector at St. Mary of the Immaculate Conception parish in Avon, Ohio, Osborne and his wife Della have been married for 41 years. They have four children and six grandchildren.

And, wouldn't you know it: The couple first met, formally, at a dance in the St. Joseph High gymnasium. Which probably goes a long way in explaining why Rich Osborne has held such fond memories of his alma mater for so many years.

Euclid Creek Tunnel project to reduce pollution

The Northeast Ohio Regional Sewer District has broken ground on a large construction project that may impact some Collinwood residents. However, this project will impact all of Cleveland's residents because the project will reduce pollution in our streams and lake, improving our city's environment.

The Euclid Creek Storage Tunnel is part of a larger network of underground tunnels that are being constructed to considerably reduce combined sewer overflows.

Greater Cleveland's earliest sewers (primarily within the City and its inner-ring suburbs) are combined sewers. Built around the turn of the 19th century, these sewers carry sewage, industrial waste and stormwater in a single pipe. During heavy rains, there is a dramatic increase of water flowing through the combined sewers. When this happens, control devices may allow some of the combined wastewater and stormwater to overflow into area waterways-such as Lake Erie and Euclid Creek-to prevent urban flooding. This event is called a combined sewer overflow, or CSO, and harms our clean water environment.

Currently, CSOs in the Euclid Creek area overflow more than 60 times a year. When the tunnel is completed, overflows should be reduced to four or less in a typical year of rainfall.

At Euclid Beach State Park on Lake Erie, additional features have been designed to further reduce CSOs. New relief sewers will also be constructed to decrease flooding problems along Lake Shore Boulevard (east of Euclid Creek) and near Holmes Avenue and East 152nd Street.

PROJECT LOCATION & DESCRIPTION

The Euclid Creek Storage Tunnel starts in Bratenahl, south of Interstate 90, and continues northeast to the Sewer District's Easterly Wastewater Treatment Plant. There, the tunnel will continue under Lake Erie for about 3000 feet and pass under the shoreline near Green Creek at East 152nd Street. The tunnel will then head east, following Lake Shore Boulevard and Nottingham Road, and end at St. Clair Avenue (see map).

The Euclid Creek Storage Tunnel will be located 190 to 220 feet below ground. The tunnel will be 18,000 feet long, with a diameter of 24 feet. It will have the capacity to hold 52 million gallons of combined stormwater and wastewater.

In addition to the tunnel, a large mining shaft and four drop shafts will be constructed. The largest shaft - near Nine Mile Creek in Bratenahl - is where most of the project's work, including most of the excavation, will take place. The four drop shafts will be located at the Sewer District's Easterly Wastewater Treatment Plant; Beulah Park near Lakeshore Boulevard and East 156th Street; Triangle Park near Lakeshore Boulevard, Nottingham Road and East 174th Street; and near the intersection of St. Clair Avenue and Nottingham Road.

NEIGHBORHOOD IMPACT

Tunnels such as these will reduce the number of CSOs each year, ensuring a cleaner environment for you and your Cleveland neighbors. As with any large construction project, there will be some inconveniences, but we will work with Councilmen Eugene Miller and Michael Polensek to notify you of our

progress and try to minimize them as much as possible.

Many Collinwood residents have noticed work taking place at several of the aforementioned locations: trees have been cleared, utilities are being relocated, sound walls and fencing is being installed and several buildings have been or will be demolished. Crews will be onsite to set up and install shaft collars which will indicate where the shafts will be excavated.

Workers construct the Mill Creek Tunnel, a separate Sewer District project expected to be complete in 2012. This tunnel is similar to the Euclid Creek Tunnel.



The Euclid Creek Tunnel, expected to be complete in 2015, will be 18,000 feet long, 24 feet in diameter and be located 200 feet below ground.

Zucchini Pie Recipe

I recently asked my favorite chef Mike White (Michaelangelo's in Little Italy) what the summer recipe should be for this observer, and his advice was to not plan a recipe, just go to the local fresh market and get whatever jumps out at you. A quick stop to Cavotta's on Nottingham and Voila! The amazing zucchini with the beautiful color of the yellow squash right next to it screamed zucchini pie as I approached them.

2 medium zucchini, cubed into

1 medium or large onion, finely chopped

1 ¹/₂ cup mozzarella cheese

1 package crescent rolls

Preheat oven to 350. Open the croissants, and use them one at a time to fully cover a pie pan. Then lightly cover the whole bottom and sides of the crust with the mustard.

Step 2:

In a large frying pan on medium to low heat, melt the butter, and saute the onion, zucchini, salt and pepper, stirring occasionally for 20 to 30 minutes until the onions and zucchini are clear, but not browned.

Step 3:

Remove the pan from heat and let it cool for five to 10 minutes.

Step 4:

Lightly beat the eggs and add the eggs, plus the cheese to the pan. Mix thoroughly.

Step 5:

Pour egg and vegetable mixture into the mustard-covered crescent roll pie crust.



Step 6:

Bake at 350 degrees for one hour. Let it cool for 10-15 minutes before cutting.

I recommend pairing it with a light salad of fresh greens, nuts, mandarin oranges and a summer-like raspberry vinaigrette, with a glass of white wine.

This is great for vegetarians, and it makes excellent leftovers, warmed or served cold.

*This is my mom's exact recipe. I made three little changes for my version. I added two cloves of finely chopped in garlic; used one zucchini and one yellow squash (as this works well with all colors of squashes); and used one cup of mozzarella cheese and one half cup of parmesan cheese. Oh, and I like a little more mustard on the bottom than my mom does, but I think that's because I use a fancier kind.

Fresh Catch

Back in October of 2009, a little TO GO restaurant opened up on East 185th St. by the name of Fresh Catch. It is tucked away in the Family Dollar plaza at the north end of the street across from the Blue Parrot. Since then, I have been a frequent customer. Shawn, the owner is usually the man doing all the cooking. And holy mackerel, can he cook.

I am sure that part of the success of this restaurant is due to how busy they are. There is always a line, be sure to call ahead, and I guarantee you, you will not be disappointed. Because they are so busy, the food is always fresh. My favorite thing to order is the lobster special which comes with the most delicious lobster tail around. It also includes scampi's, fried shrimp, homemade french fries, and coleslaw. The food quality on every part of this meal is a solid 10. Plus Shawn sprinkles on some sort of magical seasoning dust, which manages to add a very unique and delicious flavor without adding any heat. I am also a huge fan of the tilapia dinner, which comes with very generous sized pieces of tilapia and again, the delicious homemade french fries and coleslaw. These are just two of the many wonderful dishes on the menu

The side dishes are so amazingly good that they run out of them frequently. My favorites are the spaghetti with meat sauce, and the green beans. Do not forget dessert. My wife's favorites are the German chocolate cake and the red velvet cake.

The next night you think it's too hot to cook stop at Fresh Catch for dinner. You will not be disappointed.

Cuyahoga County Land Bank's First Two Years a Ringing Success, **CSU Professor Reports Impressive Progress in Study**

In the two years since its formation as a tool to battle the foreclosure crisis, the Cuyahoga County Land Reutilization Corporation, commonly referred to as the Land Bank, has acquired more than 1,200 abandoned properties, forged groundbreaking partnerships with Fannie Mae, the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development and leading banks, and has been recognized as a national role model for other communities. After two years, there are agreements in place and are still unique on a national level. These relationships have now turned into ongoing partnerships.

The Land Bank's 2009- 2011 Report, released July 14th, details the impressive progress made by the innovative, non-profit community improvement corporation since enabling legislation was signed into law in January, 2009.

The report, written by Dr. Dennis Keating, Director of the Master of Urban Planning, Design and Development Program at Cleveland State University, highlights the Land Bank's most significant accomplishments over the last two years.

Funded primarily by penalties and interest paid on delinquent prop-

erty taxes, the Land Bank's aim is to acquire abandoned, neglected properties that blight entire neighborhoods and lower home values. Several hundred properties acquired by the Land Bank have been turned over to cities for redevelopment, and the rest have been or are scheduled to be rehabbed or demolished. Furthermore, demolition has often resulted in innovative land reuse through the creation of urban gardens, additions to the plots of current homeowners or the holding of properties through strategic land assembly for future development.

Besides removing neighborhood eyesores that tend to attract vandals and other criminal elements, the Land Bank's acquisition of such properties helps thwart speculators who snap up foreclosed homes in hopes of "flipping" them for a quick profit. Dr. Keating notes in the report that speculation was a major factor in the collapse of the local real estate market.

Fannie Mae and HUD are aiding in the effort to reduce real estate speculation by turning over foreclosed homes to the Land Bank for nominal sums, rather than making them available to house flippers. Leading mortgage lenders Wells Fargo and Bank of

America have also just recently agreed to donate foreclosed properties to the Land Bank based on the Land Bank's demonstrated skill and capacity developed in just two short years. This never would have been dreamed of two years ago.

Since the creation of the Cuyahoga County Land Bank in 2009, three Ohio counties - Trumbull, Mahoning and Lucas - have established land banks. Two others - Montgomery and Hamilton – are in the process of developing theirs. Localities in other states have also looked to the Cuyahoga Land Bank while formulating their entities.

"The CCLRC is the first of its kind 'land bank' in the nation and has served as both a statewide and national model," Dr. Keating wrote.

In a foreword to the report, Land Bank President Gus Frangos points with pride to the organization's many achievements and concludes: "The CCLRC is a valuable tool in positively dealing with the fallout from the real estate market collapse. The CCLRC's professional staff is making a difference day in and day out."

Citing the CCLRC as a satisfying accomplishment, Senator Tom Patton states, "CCLRC has kept its promises - and then some."

His voice joins those of many other civic, city of Cleveland, county, suburban, and legislative leaders in the report, all praising the Land Bank for its contribution to helping combat the fallout from the foreclosure crisis.

"We are proud of what we have accomplished since opening our doors in 2009," said Frangos, "There is still much more to do and we are committed to making a positive, lasting impact on Cuyahoga County through our efforts."

Collinwood Resident is Awarded Pat Tillman Scholarship

The Pat Tillman story is certainly a compelling saga. During the prime of his career as an NFL linebacker he retired to enlist in the US Army in 2002, in the Army Ranger program. Deeply affected by the events of 9/11 he felt very strongly about doing his part in the US war on terror, even though he was at some odds with the Iraq war and possibly being used for propaganda purposes. Tragically, he was killed in action in 2004, a victim of friendly fire.

The Pat Tillman Foundation was formed to honor his legacy. One of the foundation's activities is the Tillman Military Scholars Program.

Kevin Gallagher, a Collinwood resident, was recently named as a Tillman Military Scholar, 1 out of a class of 60 nationwide.

The Tillman Military Scholars program honors student veterans who share the traits of Pat Tillman: Excelling academically and giving back to community. Tillman graduated summa cum laude from Arizona State University, in just 3-1/2 years, while playing football.

Student veteran candidates apply for the program by writing 3 in-depth essays, and 2 follow-up essays. (Perhaps the Observer can recruit Kevin ?) The essay's covered topics like: How does your career plan benefit the commuinity, the greater good.. Over 1000 peple applied for this most recent class of 60.

Kevin served in the US Navy from 2004-2008. He was stationed in Japan and served on the aircraft carrier USS Kitty Hawk, first as a plane captain and then in aviation ordnance. Plane captains do pre and post flight inspections of aircraft, and perform the hand signal communication with the jet crew.

Kevin is entering graduate school at Cleveland State, where he will be pursuing a masters degree in Global Political Interactions - "A degree where business meets politics" says Kevin. Kevin is currently carrying a 3.5 grade average and is the president of the CSU chapter of the Sigma Tau Gamma fraternity. Sigma Tau Gamma was founded by 17 student veterans following World War I. Along with his fraternity work Kevin serves his community in several ways: the Greater Cleveland volunteers, Coit Road Farmers Market, Susan B. Komen foun-

dation, and the Pat Tillman foundation He was well traveled, even prior to his Naval service, where he saw 12 countries in the Pacific rim. He was born and

lived in Ireland until the age of 5,then off to England for a year. His family moved to the United States where he lived until age 12, and then returned to county Limerick Ireland at 13, and back to the US at age 17. Life in the Navy is long periods at sea and was difficult at times, but a strong comraderie is a lingering memory of Kevin's . "The ocean is a whole different world, the sea life is fascinating" according to Kevin.

It sure seems Pat Tillman would agree when Kevin says: "I feel if people are in a position to help others that are deserving, than they have an obligation to do so.'
