GOVERNOR JOHN KASICH: Plan a visit to Cleveland Lakefront State Park!

Governor Kasich,

My name is Stephen Love and for the past 3 years, I have organized and coordinated an entirely volunteer Adopta-Beach team-(part of a network of Adopt-a-Beach teams throughout the Great Lakes supported by The Alliance for the Great Lakes) at Euclid Beach State Park in Cleveland. Our volunteer group, along with two other dedicated volunteer groups at Edgewater State Park--The Friends of Edgewater and Drink Local Drink Tap, have had hundreds of people from the community, local schools, colleges and businesses take part in beach cleanups twice a month, picking up thousands of pounds of trash, raising money for trash and recycling bins and signage and creating events and programming that encourage visitors to enjoy and respect our lakefront parks.

We believe Cleveland Lakefront State Parks (Edgewater, Gordon Park, Euclid Beach, Villa Angela and Wildowood) are public assets to the surrounding communities and serve as a lakefront destination for the entire Northeast Ohio region. At the same time, we are deeply concerned that our Lakefront parks are chronically underfunded and understaffed. From leaky toilets in park restrooms and overflowing trash cans, to one park ranger on duty at a time, our Lakefront State Paks are becoming liabilities more than assets. Recent coverage of the deteriorating conditions in our parks by the press and media

have prompted the Ohio Department of Natural Resources to push for immediate improvements of "first impression" items including mulching flower beds, cleaning and opening vandalized restrooms and installing new signage throughout the park. While we applaud these improvements and believe they make the parks more inviting, they do not address the long term infrastructure and ongoing maintenance issues.

In an effort to address immediate maintenance, littering enforcement and security needs, our three groups are now in the process of launching a volunteer led "Park Ambassador" program to create a safer, cleaner and more inviting park experience. However, all our volunteer initiatives and activities combined will be fruitless in the absence of a long term plan to address sustained maintenance and desperately needed infrastructure improvements.

That is why on behalf of all of our volunteers and the citizens of Cleveland, we invite you to come visit Cleveland

Lakefront State Park.We would be happy to take you around to see the recent improvements made to the park, the positive impact of our volunteers activities but most importantly, the many maintenance and infrastructure challenges that still lie ahead.



Waterloo Arts & Entertainment District receives \$500,000 ArtPlace Grant

The Waterloo Arts & Entertainment District is fast becoming one of the top night-time destinations for Clevelanders, with an assortment of funky music venues, art galleries and independent stores. A \$500,000 grant from Art-Place, announced today, will add even more energy to a district that is already fast on its way to success.

ArtPlace funding will support the launch of "Collinwood Rising," a collaborative effort to transform the North Shore Collinwood neighborhood by engaging artists in creatively combating urban vacancy and foreclosure at the community level. Central to the plan is reimagining vacant land

First round of Artists in Residence grants is announced

Six artists who live or work in North Shore Collinwood were awarded a total of \$30,000 to support their community art projects through the Artists in Residence grant program. This program, part of a special two-year neighborhood arts initiative of Northeast Shores and the Community Partnership for Arts and Culture, aims to support artists in the community and involve residents in making the neighborhood a better place to live. It will award another \$95,000 in two more rounds of applications between now and fall of 2013. "These community art projects have leveraged and sparked local artist and non-artist interest in purchasing homes within the boundaries of The Waterloo Arts and Entertainment District. People want to be in a thriving, cutting-edge community," commented Camille Maxwell, Real Estate Development Director at Northeast Shores. The six projects that were recently awarded funding are described below.

Shawn Mishak was awarded a grant to create a documentary describing life in North Shore Collinwood through the eves of residents and create a piece of art representing each resident interviewed. Everything will be exhibited at a premier event that will be free and open to the public. Mishak also hopes to show the film at other events and submit it to film festivals so that it and Collinwood will gain more exposure.

Erin Randel's "Scoop on Summer" pamphlet was also awarded a grant. The large brochure provides a calendar of the events and activities going on in North Shore Collinwood this summer. It is available for free in many areas around the neighborhood.

Jef Scharf received funding to give Collinwood a portable silk-screen printing device to print posters, t-shirts and flyers. He will also provide workshops,

which will take place at Arts Collinwood, to teach residents how to operate the press and use its products to inform

Omid Tavakoli was awarded a grant to reopen the sculpture garden located outside the Zaller building on Waterloo Rd. He plans to fill the space with outdoor sculptures, exotic plants and a pond. The space will be open to the public. The project will also improve the safety and walkability of the area by adding an outdoor lighting system.

Krista Tomorowitz received funding to create a pop-up fashion studio and interactive sewing lab in a vacant storefront. The shop will teach high school students basic sewing and fashion skills. This project will culminate with a fashion show and clothing sale featuring the work of the students.

Doug Wood received a grant to host a series of free summer music education and appreciation classes for school-aged children. The hour-long classes will each feature a different guest performer in a different genre of music including blues, jazz and American folk music.

The members of the panel that made the final grant recommendations were neighborhood residents Andrea Hinton, Charlotte Iafeliece, and Brian Licht, assisted by Vince Reddy of LAND Studio, and Nelson Beckford of The Cleveland Foundation. The grant program is made possible through the generous support of Leveraging Investments in Creativity, the Kresge Foundation, the Ford Foundation and Charter One Growing Communities.

is taking applications for the 2012 Paint Voucher Program through August 1, 2012. Eligible South Collinwood applicants could receive vouchers for up to \$400 in free paint and supplies. You will be responsible for the labor cost involved to paint your home, if approved.

To Qualify:

- Must be a low or moderate-income family (call for income guidelines).
- The applicant may be the owner or tenant, however, he/she must reside in the South Collinwood house being painted. If the applicant is a tenant, he/she must get signed permission from the owner to participate in the program.
- Must receive Lead Safe Work Practice instructions at the time of application.

- 1. Get an application by calling CNVDC at (216) 383-9772.
- 2. Complete the application and submit ALL required documentation by August 1, 2012. Painting must be done within 30 days of application approval.
- . Required documentation: proof of ownership, proof of income, etc. Call (216) 383-9772 for details.
- 4. \$60 refundable cash deposit due upon admission to the program. The \$60 will be refunded to you upon passing the final inspection of the paint job and clean-up.

Your house must be in good repair and also be in **South Collinwood** to qualify for the paint program. If you have other housing repair needs, call CNVDC or go online at www.cnvdc.org for information on other housing assistance programs available to Cleveland homeowners. Vouchers and funds are limited. Please call as soon as possible to verify all restrictions for the program and to be put on the waiting list. We look forward to working with you.

Cleveland Industrial Innovation Center jumpstarts Collinwood High **School Industrial Internship Program**

Cleveland Industrial Innovation Center (CiiC) has hired two Collinwood High School students as participants in Collinwood High School's Industrial Internship Program. Juniors, Dahryce Hogan and Anthony Battle entered into the program at the end of this school year and will work through the summer along with 2011 Collinwood graduate DeAndre Hairston as an integral part of the maintenance staff of the facility; focusing primarily on maintenance and improvement of the grounds, an area totaling 65 acres. The students will also be directly involved with a planned 48,000 square foot expansion for one of the flagship tenants, NatGasCar. The work will expose the students to a multitude of construction and maintenance skills over the course of the summer.

This program is the brainchild of Councilman Mike Polensek and is intended to attract local, hard-working, disciplined students to the manufacturing businesses in the area. Crystal Maclin, Collinwood High School Principal, was instrumental in assembling a list of candidates suitable for the open positions and worked with CiiC to assure a good fit. The internship, if all parties agree, will lead to a full-time position upon graduation.

It is the hope of the sponsors and participants, that this program will expand after this inaugural period, with dozens of local manufacturing companies participating; bringing local youths and local businesses together.

Collinwood teens prove "Love" can take them to graduation

Local business and civic leaders saluted 51 teenage girls from Collinwood High School on Wednesday, June 20 for doing what the odds said the girls would likely not do: get their diploma.

But the girls proved that a little love can go a long way in turning an at-risk teen into a high-school grad. And that's what the 51 girls are now,

thanks to "Believe to Achieve," a pilot program that Project Love, a nonprofit, brought to the Cleveland Metropolitan School District five years ago. With substantial funding from Alcoa

Inc., Project Love's "Believe to Achieve" set out to turn around the achievement gap of teenage girls. It succeeded. In 2008, the program identified 72

eighth-grade girls who were at risk of dropping out in the ninth grade. Of that total, 71 of the girls entered Believe to Achieve, which provided the teenagers the training, skills and nurturing

they needed to stay in school.

Of the 71 girls who entered the program as ninth-graders, 51 received a diploma this month. Their 71 percent graduation rate is higher than the District's average of 62.8 percent.

From the remaining total, seven girls are expected to complete the Ohio Graduation Test.

Many of the graduates will attend college. Even more remarkable, eight of the top 11 academic achievers honored at Collinwood's commencement were "Believe to Achieve" participants.

"These young women were transformed from underachievers into super-achievers with this program as the only major factor changing in their lives," said Rataniit Sondhe, Project

Sondhe said Project Love is now seeking money to expand the program next year to 12 District high schools.

Gov. Kasich signs Mayor Jackson's "Cleveland Plan" into law

Gov. John Kasich signed the "Cleveland Plan for Transforming Schools" into law Monday inside the auditorium at John F. Kennedy High School, an action that trumpets a new beginning for the 43,000 students enrolled in the Cleveland Metropolitan School District.

In signing the legislation, Kasich thanked members of the Cleveland Teachers Union and their leadership for being receptive to the transformation, which came at a cost to union membership. "But they demonstrated that they could put the kids first," Kasich said. "It's fantastic what is happening here."

What is happening, said Kasich and Mayor Frank Jackson, who led the effort to get the measure passed, is that Cleveland's schools have the legislative muscle to improve learning and reshape educational outcomes. The legislation removes obstacles that, CEO Eric Gor-

don had said, stalled the changes he had sought to remake a school system that produced far too many dropouts and not enough positive outcomes.

Under the legislation, Gordon and his leadership team can, among other things:

- Make tenure and seniority secondary considerations in layoffs, which will allow the District to retain high-performing and specialized teachers.
- Let the District share property tax money with selected charter schools.
- Give the city and District a voice in which charters can open new schools
- Set up a salary differential for teachers, which means performance becomes the No. 1 criterion for pay. The better the teacher, the higher the teacher's pay.

Two of the more sweeping options allow for longer school days and for year-round schooling.

Now, Kasich said, Gordon and his administration have to make the plan work. "I was talking to Eric here, and I said, 'It's all on you now, Eric. You screw up, we're blaming you," Kasich joked. He told the audience at the signing that the focus of the transformation plan has always been students. For the students' sake, those who were critics of Mayor

Jackson's original proposal were willing to discuss it, and what all sides came up with was a plan that had broad support. "Sometimes we have to remind ourselves that education's for kids, not for adults," Kasich said. "In this case, kids have been put first."

First unveiled in February, Mayor Jackson's so-called "Cleveland Plan" led to an unlikely alliance, which included Kasich. Democrats and Republicans in the Ohio Legislature, Gordon and his administration, leaders of the Cleveland Teachers Union and members of the Cleveland Board of Education. "With this legislation, we now have the possibility - and really a great possibility - of creating a different outcome," Jackson said.

Kasich said the city of Cleveland and its school leaders had had enough of those negative outcomes. They resolved to fix education.

While walking through the parks on the morning of July 5th, I saw the deplorable conditions firsthand: trash all over the pavilion, trash all over the grass, foil trays and balloons left as if the barbeque was going to pick back up any minute!

Thankfully, state park maintenance staff was already on the scene taking care of the mess, especially in light of Mark Naymik's recent series of articles in the Plain Dealer highlighting the embarrassing conditions of Euclid Beach and Edgewater State Parks. In fact, since the series of articles, maintenance crews have frequented both parks planting flowers, laying down mulch and fixing benches-all calls

from on high in the ODNR to make cosmetic improvements to quiet growing criticism. It's a great temporary improvement but is far from solving the bigger issues at play.

While the question of longterm stewardship, staffing shortages and ownership looms over policymakers and decisionmakers heads (State Parks vs. Cleveland Metroparks), the question we need to be asking ourselves today is does it matter who operates the park if we cannot be our own stewards?

Millions of dollars in deferred infrastructure and maintenance investment aside, if we cannot take our own initiative to respect our public spaces and lakefront assets (neglected as they may be), then shame on us for complaining and pointing the finger at the State of Ohio!

Great parks are respected parks. If we all want a better lakefront park then the least we can do is start acting like we will take care of it when the day comes! And it starts with simply PICKING UP YOUR TRASH! Wildwood Wetland and Stream **Restoration Project update**

The Lacustrine Refuge is a wetland and stream restoration project located in Wildwood State Park in the City of Cleveland. Located on the Main Branch of Euclid Creek near Lake Erie, this ~\$1.4 million dollar Great Lakes Restoration Initiative (GLRI) funded project aims to restore three acres of urban coastal wetlands and restore 1,100 linear feet of shoreline habitat to serve as a fish habitat refuge and nursery for the urban coastal estuary zone. An estuary, or lacustuary in freshwater systems, provides habitat for nearshore fish and typically consists of wetlands. Today, the Euclid Creek estuarine zone has been modified for a public park and marina.

In the Spring of 2011, the Cuyahoga Soil & Water Conservation District (Cuyahoga SWCD) engaged the services of consultant team RiverWorks (EnviroScience, GDP Group, and RiverReach Construction) to design and construct the project. While developing the project design, the consultants sampled fish populations to see what fish are present before the project is constructed. Once the restoration is complete, post construction monitoring will take place to see if fish and bug populations have increased with the hopes of finding new fish species in Euclid Creek, like Bowfin and Northern Pike.

Another project goal is to control several of the exotic invasive plants that are taking over native vegetation in the park. The two main culprits, Japanese knotweed and Phragmites, are plants that cannot be controlled through pulling by hand. The EnviroScience crew sprayed these plants several times over the past year with a non-toxic herbicide that does not hurt aquatic fish and bug species in nearby Euclid Creek, or humans and pets using the park for recreation. These invasive plants outcompete native plant

biodiversity thus displacing and decreasing populations of wildlife, butterflies, and birds that rely on native plants for food, shelter and breeding.

The project team is close to finalizing all of the necessary permitting and reviews with local and federal agencies. This process has taken a considerable amount of time and resources to satisfy the various permits, including an intensive review from the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers hydraulic division for the proposed modification to the 1980's diversion channel that created the oxbow condition (i.e. what is considered the main channel of Euclid Creek today). While our Great Lakes restoration project is not a flood control project, the project underwent a similar level of scrutiny and review. The Army Corps has approved the proposed changes to the area based on rigorous hydraulic studies, flood elevations and evaluation of risk. The proposed restoration project does not increase flood elevations that exist today. The removal of a majority of the island sediment for wetlands and an increase in stream width and capacity at the mouth of the oxbow area actually improve current conditions, while meeting the habitat restoration goals of the project. The modified diversion channel will not be removed entirely but will exist as an overflow conveyance channel similar to its original intention when floodwaters reach a certain height.

The project is nearing groundbreaking and residents may see more construction equipment and activity starting in July.

Waterloo Alley Cat Project awarded grant from ASPCA

The national office of the American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals (ASPCA) has recognized the Waterloo Alley Cat Project (WACP) as being worthy of a grant specifically designated for covering the high cost of testing felines for fatal diseases, i.e. FIV/ FELV, better known as feline AIDS and leukemia. When WACP volunteers trap feral/ abandoned/ homeless cats to be taken in for spaying or neutering they must be tested for FIV/FELV first. The tough decision in every one of these instances when the cat tests positive, is that it usually results in euthanasia, with very rare exceptions. The least expensive rescue rate offered anywhere in Cleveland is \$30 per cat. Multiply that by the 100+ cats trapped to date and the cost is in the astronomical ballpark of \$3,000.

WACP would like to publicly and wholeheartedly thank the ASPCA for their vital support. Their assistance contributes so much to the quality of life of all residents and to the health of outdoor cats in the Waterloo neighborhood.
