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### "Frankenstorm" hits Collinwood

WOW! What a Week! "Frankenstorm" will not soon be forgotten! My heartfelt thanks to all the Police, Fire, EMS and above all the Electrical Line Crews and Urban Forestry for their response to one of the most dangerous and destructive storms our community has seen since 1993. I also wish to thank, above all, the residents who were without power or who experienced damage to their property and who exhibited great patience and understanding.

However, the storm also highlighted the weaknesses within CPP and First Energy's ability to respond to such a severe storm. CPP's Call and Trouble Center was a major problem with residents unable to get through for days even to report downed lines. First Energy sending emergency crews to the East Coast knowing that Northeast Ohio was in the path of the storm was unexplainable. Nonetheless, Mayor Jackson assured Council that there would be an "aftermath review" of what worked and what did not work from the City's perspective. I hope that they look at all facets of the City's response and take the appropriate action to ensure that basic utility service can be restored in a reasonable timeframe if and when we find ourselves in the face of another monstrous storm, once again.

Many of you read an article in the Sunday, October 28, Plain Dealer regarding the spike in crime in Cleveland's 5th District. As a result, I had calls into the office asking, "how big is the 5th District?" The 5th District, of which the 11th Ward is a part, runs from East 55th Street east to East 200th Street and north of Cedar Avenue to the Lake. It encompasses the entire Northeast side of the City. Obviously, our concerns are about the criminal activity that is in our neighborhood.

Of the 28 homicides that occurred in the 5th District, six (6) of those were in our community; three (3) were drugrelated, two (2) were gang-related and the last one was a party that "went terribly wrong." None of these were "indiscriminate acts of violence"; in other words, the victims knew their assailants and vice versa. From my experience over the years, unless you have a police officer right at the scene it is almost impossible to stop this type of senseless violence.

Burglaries occur to occupied property and break-ins are at unoccupied structures. Clearly, these types of crimes can be greatly deterred by observant and "nosey" neighbors. Ward 11 has the distinction of having the lowest crime rate on Cleve-

land's east side. Unfortunately, if you or your family have been victims, that is not much consolation. I know that first-hand.

So, how do we as a progressive community, combat criminal activity?

By becoming more proactive, by paying more attention to what is going on around us and on our streets. We have neighborhood groups and organizations which you can become involved in and who are working daily to improve the "quality of life" of our community. At the end of the day, though, the best and safest streets in the city are those where the residents are engaged and will not tolerate the "hood mentality." You have heard me say that a community is only as good as the people in it, well that holds truer today than ever before.

I call upon all concerned citizens to be the eyes and ears of the Police. There are neighborhoods in this city where people see, hear and do nothing. We are not like that. I for one would never want to subject my family to a neighborhood like that. That is why we need to stand together. Set the tone and send the message: WE WILL NOT TOLERATE CRIMINAL ACTIVITY IN OUR COMMUNITY. Let's keep Ward 11 safe and strong.

### Mike Polensek – Now the Longest Serving Councilman in Cleveland City Council History

Congratulations to our Councilman, Michael Polensek, on achieving the distinction of being the longest-serving Councilman in the history of Cleveland City Council. He follows a line of many distinguished men and women who have served Cleveland since the time of our founding in July 1796. As of October 17th he has served the Greater Collin-

wood community for 34 years, 9 months and 15 days.

This is a significant achievement and one that needs to be celebrated. Cleveland City Council acknowledged this achievement on Monday, October 22 in Council and with a cake. Having known the Councilman since I was a young girl,

### Cleveland School Levy passes

Issue 107, the 15 mill levy for the Cleveland Metropolitan schools, passed last Tuesday night, with 55% of voters' approval. In Cleveland, an average home's value is \$58,000, which means the levy will cost a typical homeowner \$264 more a year.

For those who would like to know how the district justifies asking for such a large sum, Collinwood's Nan Kennedy, grandmother of children attending Cleveland public schools has this to offer:

"Pause for a moment: the Cleveland schools were making progress, to wit: graduation rate up 23%; safety incidents down 42%; 23% of schools in the top two ratings in 2010-11, compared to only 9% two years earlier; and 42% rated Continuous Improvement or higher, against only 25%; highest rating from the state auditor for 2007 to 2011.

Then state and federal funding was cut (by \$140 million), local tax collections shrank – and the schools cut 595 teachers. Could a drop in funding halt the upward progress? How could it not?..."

She goes on to describe what the District has already done: "The board cut 92 head office positions, and the remaining staff took a 5% pay cut and agreed to higher health insurance premiums, while taking on the workload of the departed staffers. Eric Gordon took a salary cut, and is now making \$50,000 less than his predecessor, and he drives his own car instead of using a district car and driver...

She points out that the first thing the district will do is put back what they had to take away: "Key programs have been cut to save money; they'll be restored. Teachers will be hired back; the full school day will be restored, too." Nan's Notes, September, 2012.

According to Citizens for our Children's Future, the committe formed by Superintendent Eric Gordon and Mayor Frank Jackson, here are their goals: 1. Attract, retain and

From an office on the east side of Cleveland, long-time Collinwood resident and 25-year-old Darvio E. Morrow connects with the rest of the world on a daily basis.

Darvio is the Founder and CEO of FCB Musera, a digital multimedia company that owns several online radio stations and record labels. The stations broadcast to anyone around the world with an internet connection and have a wide range of listeners from Cleveland to Brazil. "I was thrilled to see our numbers going up in Latin countries," said Darvio. "That's where the future is."

Musera Radio, the company's main product, has tens of thousands of monthly listeners and its group of record labels have a digital distribution deal with a company recently acquired by Sony Music Entertainment. But one of the things that Mr. Morrow is most proud of is the neighborhood that he started his company in almost ten years ago, Collinwood.

Darvio was born and raised on the south side of Collinwood and has a particular affinity for the northeast Cleveland neighborhood. "I try to explain to people what it's like growing up in Collinwood, but its hard to put it into words. It's a unique place," Darvio said. ### Sewer District schedules regular community meetings about Euclid Creek Tunnel

The Northeast Ohio Regional Sewer District is currently constructing the Euclid Creek Tunnel; this large storage tunnel will capture and store combined sewage - a mixture of sanitary sewage and stormwater - until it can be safely treated at the Easterly Wastewater Treatment Plant on the shores of Lake Erie. Oftentimes, this bacteria-laden combined sewage is discharged directly into the environment because neither the treatment plant nor connected infrastructure is capable of capturing the increased flow during heavy storms. The Euclid Creek Tunnel will mitigate much of this pollution, resulting in a safer Collinwood.

The Sewer District has planned a series of regularly-scheduled meetings to address any customer concerns about this project. Meetings will typically occur the third Tuesday of each month

at 4 p.m. at the Collinwood Recreation Center (16300 Lakeshore Blvd.). The current schedule is:

November 2012

**November 13** (moved to the second Tuesday because of Thanksgiving) December 18 January 15 February 19

In addition, a new blog was created to keep customers informed. It can be viewed at http://euclidcreek.blogspot.com/.

The Mill Creek Tunnel, the Sewer District's first completed tunnel, successfully captured 75 million gallons of combined sewage during "Superstorm Sandy," preventing discharge into Mill Creek.

The Euclid Creek Tunnel will hold 60.5 million gallons of combined sewage at a time and is expected to be complete in late 2014.

and now having worked for him for the past 14 years, I see the passion and the dedication that Mike puts into his community each day. It's frustrating many times but also very fulfilling when you can achieve something for the community or help someone. I know Mike feels very much the same way. He is the first to tell you that though looking back it seems to be a very long time, when you are doing something you are passionate about the time seems so short.

Until this past week Mr. Herman Finkle held the distinction of being the longest serving Councilman. He served from January 6, 1918 to October 21, 1952. The Republican floor leader died at the Cleveland Clinic probably of cardiac arrest stemming from major surgery he had six months prior. The Cleveland Plain Dealer wrote this about him at that time, "[H]is tenure as a city councilman represented one of the longest unbroken terms of political service in the history of Cleveland and probably one of the longest in the history of the United States. The man who was urged to oppose Mayor Thomas A. Burke in the last three mayoralty campaigns, but who always declined the honor, left a long record of accomplishment in the municipal legislature." He attended to his duties and Council meetings almost up to the end. He was 61 years of age.

During the years Councilman Finkle served just think of what was going on in Cleveland, in the State of Ohio, our Nation and in the World!

Councilman Polensek, too, has left behind a long record of legislative accomplishments as well as community accomplishments and he has time yet in front of him to "pound the pavement" and help to make the improvements our Collinwood and Nottingham communities need. Having been born and raised in the Collinwood community it was only natural that if he went into politics, or as Mike has always said, was "challenged to put his passions where his mouth was," that he would serve his community. Mike did just that and was elected to office in November 1977 and sworn into office as Councilman of Ward 26 on January 4, 1978.

It was a tumultuous time in the City of Cleveland but through perseverance he weathered that storm and all other storms since then. He has served no less than five Mayors and several different Council Presidents - (having served as Council President himself in 2000-2001) each with their own unique personalities. Oh! the stories Mike can tell!

When you see the Councilman, tell him congratulations on this achievement. His service as our Councilman hasn't been easy – even though he makes it seem like it – but I believe that it has been life fulfilling. He has achieved much for our community and there is still so much more to go!

This is a lot to accomplish in four years, which is when the levy expires. Both Superintendent Eric Gordon and Mayor Frank Jackson have accepted the challenge to make enough gains in that time, to convince Cleveland voters to renew it.

proud to be from Collinwood."

Darvio heavily credits his education for leading him down the path of being an entrepreneur in the Entertainment industry. That too can be attributed to Collinwood, as Darvio had his educational start at St. John Nottingham Lutheran School on the neighborhood's north side. "I was there from K

to 8th. I love that place. St. John gave me so much. I will forever be in debt to them," said Darvio. "Some of my closest friends I met at St. John. That was the first place outside of my home that I heard that I could be whatever I wanted to be."

Darvio still lives in Collinwood, although he is moving soon and does not spend as much time in the neighborhood as he would like. He still keeps up with current events in the neighborhood, is a fan of tough-as-nails North Collinwood Councilman Michael Polensek, and even cheers on the struggling Collinwood Railroaders football team. Periodically, Darvio also volunteers his time at the Collinwood Recreation Center, teaching teenagers the basics of radio broadcasting in the program "The Forum."

Regardless of where the future takes Darvio and his company, it is clear that the neighborhood of Collinwood was his launching pad. "Sometimes I don't think those of us from Collinwood appreciate our neighborhood like we should. This place and the people in it gave me the confidence to go and make my own way. We're a strong, independent bunch. That's who we are. I think we need more Collinwoods."

### VASJ hosts ambassador from Republic of Slovenia

Visit includes TV appearances and meetings with Bishop Lennon, Mayor Jackson and other civic leaders

Villa Angela-St. Joseph High School (VASJ) hosted His Excellency Roman Kirn, ambassador to the United States from the Republic of Slovenia, for an extraordinary three-day visit to Cleveland as part of the "Our World Today" program at the school.

Ambassador Kirn's visit began with a meeting with Mayor Frank Jackson in the mayor's office at Cleveland City Hall on Wednesday, October 10. Also attending were Slovenian Consul General Jure Zmauc and VASJ President Richard Osborne, as well as John Lecky, executive director of the Our World Today organization. The meeting focused on business prospects in the local community and the multicultural makeup of Cleveland.

The ambassador addressed social studies classes and student leaders at VASJ on October 11. Joining the ambassador was his friend George Voinovich, former governor and senator from Ohio and former mayor of Cleveland. In addition, a luncheon for the school's Howley Scholars included Cleveland City Councilman Michael Polensek, Slovenian businessman Robert Grah and Lorie Howley, executive director of The Howley Family Foundation.

"The conversation our students had with Ambassador Kirn and the other dignitaries was a memorable experience, made possible through the generosity of The Howley Family Foundation," said Osborne. "Thanks to the Howleys, our students were given the opportunity not only to learn about Slovenia but also to have their global horizons expanded by leaders who stressed the importance of understanding all the world cultures around them.'

On Thursday afternoon, as a cooperative outreach between VASJ and Collinwood High School, Ambassador Kirn and Councilman Polensek spoke to a 9th grade assembly at Collinwood. That evening, Ambassador Kirn addressed dozens of representatives from the international communities of Cleveland at a reception at the InterContinental Hotel. On Friday morning, the ambassador met with business leaders at WKYC-TV3. He appeared on the station's "Live on Lakeside" program and was interviewed for newscasts by TV3 reporter Dick Russ, who is of Slovenian descent. Ambassador Kirn highlighted his time with students at VASJ.

"I feel like I am at home in Cleveland," Ambassador Kirn said, adding that the Slovenian presence in Cleveland sets the city apart. "Our bond with the United States is stronger than it is with any other country in the community of nations," he added.

Ambassador Kirn, along with Osborne, Lecky and Grah, later met with Toby Cosgrove, CEO of the Cleveland Clinic, and with His Excellency Richard Lennon, Bishop of Cleveland.

The ambassador was interviewed for Inside Business magazine, and the day concluded with a reception at the National Cleveland-Style Polka Hall of Fame in Euclid. There, the group was welcomed by Tony Petkovsek, chairman of the board, and Joe Valencic, president. The ambassador and guests were treated to traditional Slovenian music.

Coordinated by Admissions Director Terri Richards and the Washingtonbased Our World Today organization, VASI will continue to invite ambassadors from around the world to Cleveland in order to stimulate student awareness and interest in different nations and their people. The program also seeks to enhance public understanding of the nations of the world, promote opportunities in business and trade, and build relationships with northeastern Ohio media and governments.



### Second wave of Artists in Residence grants awarded in Waterloo: Artists begin projects to strengthen their neighborhood

Seven artists received grants today for community projects in Cleveland's Waterloo Arts and Entertainment District. A component of the Artists in Residence program, a total of \$45,000 in grants this cycle will address three community priorities between Nov 1, 2012 and March 31, 2013. These priorities were identified by the program's initial neighborhood survey "Picturing Collinwood": celebrating residents, visibility and awareness of community assets and youth.

**Neil Chastain – Youth:** The Collinwood sound project. Neil will lead a series of workshops for youth designed to engage young people in composing, creating, performing and recording original music pieces. One of the main desired goals is for participants to create a Collinwood sound compilation that they will then market and distribute.

Ray McNiece – Celebrating Residents: North Collinwood Stories – An Intergenerational Story Circle. Ray will mentor students from Villa-Angela-St. Joseph's School Honors English Program as they interview and transcribe the stories of elderly residents in the Waterloo area. The project will culminate in an inter-generational story sharing at the Collinwood Arts Café.

Lou Ross - Visibility and Awareness of Lou will oversee development of a public sculpture for placement opposite the 2013 Waterloo streetscape project. The sculpture will reflect the neighborhood's rich history of transportation and manufacturing, with wheels representing the movement of time, where we have been, are now and where we are going in the future.

Jerry Schmidt – Youth: Jerry will instruct teenagers about metalworking, using various welding techniques learned in the studio classroom. Basic mathematics, reading a tape measure and preliminary design sketching will also be taught. They will apprentice Jerry as he completes art pieces and utilitarian projects for Collinwood area merchants.




