As always in our neighborhood, we had a lively meeting on June 11th, at the E 185th St Block Watch meeting, when we welcomed the Cleveland Metroparks to Collinwood.

Totally upbeat & positive, it was wonderful to see their enthusiasm for coming in and being able to take over our lakefront parks. They were eager to share their ideas, listen to what we had to say, and answer any questions we had, handing out business cards with their contact info, and asking everyone to get in touch with them with questions and concerns.

They talked about all the great ideas they have - and are already putting in place. There's the new beach grooming machine (thanks to help from the Sewer District), for instance, that's already at work at Euclid Beach & Wildwood, that can get something like 5 or 6 inches down into the sand, & pull all the rubbish etc up and out of the beach (something they'll be doing at least once a week, and probably more often than that.) They're looking into everything from better lighting, clearing the west side of the Euclid Beach Pier, putting in lifeguards (altho not this year, due to having to recruit and train them), more security (not only more rangers - but having their Mounted unit there) etc. They're even looking into seagull "management"!

Manitowoc Foodservice breaks ground on new facility project in Collinwood

Manitowoc Foodservice Ovens and Advanced Cooking broke ground on its new 30,000 square foot Ovens expansion project in Cleveland, Ohio marking the official start of its plans to become the leading ovens manufacturer in the world.

When the expansion project is completed later in 2013, the operation will include new quality systems, computerized work instructions, lean work flow systems, and state-of-the-art warehouse operations. The Cleveland facility will produce Cleveland Steamers, Garland® convection ovens, Convotherm® combi ovens, and Lincoln conveyor ovens, along with managing the marketing and distribution of Manitowoc's Merrychef® brand speed ovens.

In addition to the manufacturing space, the new building will include a commercial kitchen which will be used for customer support (such as menu development and training), equipment testing, and sales training.

The expanded operation will improve

the service provided to foodservice customers and channel partners in the U.S. and regional markets around the world. Anticipated customer benefits include improved product availability, consolidated shipments for faster speeds and lower costs, expanded customer support, and increased reinvestment in product development.

Total investment in the project is estimated at over \$8 million, with more than 100 new manufacturing jobs to be created. "The growth and investment taking place is great news for all of us," said Glen Tellock, Chairman and CEO of Manitowoc. "I look forward to the benefits this will bring for our customers, community, and employees. By working together, we are building something real - a bright future right

NEORSD Update

I wanted to provide everyone with a brief update concerning activities at Shaft #3 of the Euclid Creek Tunnel. There have been several questions concerning blasting at this site, and we do have a new article, "Behind the Blast," posted to the blog ateuclidcreek.blogspot.com. Please rest assured that the practices used are completely controlled and monitoring equipment ensures vibrations are maintained far below the maximum allowable limits under federal law.

The vibrations are accurately measured with a series of seismographs placed around the blast site. These seismographs are placed, maintained and read by an independent third party, not the contractor or the Sewer District. These seismographs record the peak particle velocity from each blast event. Various federal, state and local municipalities and/or agencies have maximum allowable peak particle velocity for blasting; these standards have

Councilman's Corner: Historic Days in Ward 11

First of all, I would like to thank the *Observer* and all my community friends who acknowledged the passing of my mother, Dorene A. Harwood. Mom was a very private person, who raised four children by herself, and would have been overwhelmed and probably embarrassed by the outpouring of condolences. She never forgot her roots and was a "Railroader" to the very end. In fact, when she passed, she left the nursing home wearing her Collinwood Railroader t-shirt! On behalf of my family, thank you once again.

June 5 and June 6 were historic days for our community. On June 6, our lakefront beaches were transferred to the Metro Parks (see front page). On June 5, we broke ground at 18301 St. Clair Avenue for the new \$8.1 million Headquarters of the Americas for Manitowoc/Cleveland Range. Not only was this a great day for the Nottingham Village neighborhood along St Clair but for our entire Ward. After construction, Manitowoc, will employ approximately 360 people with good-paying jobs.

Finally, I don't have to explain to you the problems we are experiencing citywide regarding abandoned properties and the cutting of high grass and weeds. If there is a property, including a rear yard of a vacant home which has not been certified for grass-cutting, please get the address into my office as soon as possible. This year alone, we will spend \$48,000 for grass-cutting in Ward 11 on top of the City crews already out there. The problem is enormous; however, we will get through it with your help and support.

Public safety is another concern. Please report any suspected illegal or nuisance activity to 9-1-1. Nosy and observant neighbors make for a good and safe neighborhood.

been thoroughly tested and are determined to be safe for nearby structures and utilities. The Sewer District takes the federal government's maximum allowable peak particle velocity and cuts this level in half, and this becomes the new maximum allowable value for our projects. After each blast event, the data on the seismograph are read to ensure that these maximum values were not reached. All Sewer Dis-

trict blasts will not exceed 50 percent of

federal standards.

Lastly, did you know that the Sewer District had a Summer Sprinkling Program? Residential water use increases during the summer months because of lawn sprinkling and other seasonal use. Most of this additional water does not return to the sewer system. Under this program, summer residential sewer bills are based on either average winter water consumption, or actual summer water consumption, whichever is lower. 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





Collinwood's Yankee Doodle Dandy: Rocco Scotti

While celebrating our patriotic national holiday of July 4th, Independence Day, one local personality personifies it more to me and I'm sure to many others probably more than anyone else, and that would have to be Collinwood's own Rocco Scotti. Now 93 years old, he currently resides at the Devon Oaks Assisted Living Community in Westlake.

Rocco Eli Michael Biscotti was born January 9, 1920, in Ambler Pennsylvania outside Philadelphia. His parents, Nicholas and Madeline Biscotti were from Foggia Italy. They would move their family to Cleveland in 1923, settling first near Murray Hill on E. 120th St. In 1928 they moved to 18519 Arrowhead Ave. in Collinwood, just off East 185th Street. Here Rocco was raised with his nine siblings, first attending Oliver Hazard Perry Grade School then later Collinwood High School where he graduated in 1939. He recalled that if he didn't have a transfer ticket gotten through the school, he would have to walk the three miles from his home.

Initially he followed his father's trade as a construction laborer, but always enjoyed singing and began working with a voice coach. On July 31, 1945 he married the love of his life, June Ruppelt, to whom he would be married 66 years. Soon after they moved to Cliffside Park New Jersey to study voice in New York City, then afterwards on to Los Angeles. They would return to Cleveland in 1948, working in various

singing productions looking for Rocco's niche, including that of singing the National Anthem.

One day while heading down to sing the anthem at Municipal Stadium for an Indians game, the tenor had a revelation on just how he should sing it, adding operatic passion and zeal, and ending on a high note. It was an instant hit with the crowd, who had been used to past lackluster renditions.

The Indians thereafter continued to ask him back for every home game to the point where he became their only singer. He would continue with all the home games throughout the 1970's and 1980's. But it wasn't only baseball, it was the Browns, Cavaliers, wherever he was needed anywhere in the country. He would continue pursuing other singing opportunities, even recording some albums with the Rome Symphony Orchestra in Italy, but it was his rendi-

tion of the National Anthem that was his bread and butter.

Rocco would say that many people who sang the National Anthem do not treat it with the respect that it deserves. The anthem has been good to Rocco, allowing him to meet with many of the greats in the sports and entertainment fields who he admired.

So thanks Rocco and here's wishing you and everyone a Happy 4th, and many more to come.





Zoetic Walls Project

If Waterloo is going to be an Arts district, it should probably look like one. At least that was the thinking of Amy Callahan, Exec. Dir. of Arts Collinwood.

Amy has been largely responsible for the new murals that have been popping up all over the Waterloo Arts District. It's called the Zoetic Walls Project and it is showcasing the work of local, national, and international street artists. Walls are being transformed from bland and underutilized spaces into colorful, thought-provoking works of art. The project was created as a way to help improve the aesthetic of the neighborhood but also as a means of placemaking, showcasing Waterloo as a community where the arts are meant to thrive and be appreciated by all, a collision of fine art and urban living.

The murals have done more than just beautify the urban landscape but also serve as a forum for community engagement. Amy shared how she was pleasantly surprised about the amount of discussion there has been about the work and is happy to see that community members are excited to join in a conversation to talk about our neighborhood spaces.

But who are these artists leaving their mark all over Waterloo and where are they coming from? The answer to that is that they come from truly all over. Thus far, there has been one international and two national artists who have painted full wall murals. The twelve panels of different woodland creatures painted on the wall at the E. 156th pocket park were all done by local artists. In the next two weeks, three more national artists

Bright colors, free flowing lines and in some cases reminiscent of cubism. These are what a viewer might expect to find in the work of one of Waterloo's most recent visiting street artists RAE. A Brooklyn native, RAE's interest in street art was sparked from his interactions with hiphop and graffiti in his neighborhood growing up. Always a drawer, he wanted to paint outside so that his work could be shared. He explained that art was something that should be out in the open and viewed by all. When talking about his Collinwood piece, RAE explains that, like all of his work, he likes to use the features of the wall and play off it. Many of the lines were done without ever picking up the brush or spray can, like drawing without ever lifting the pencil.

Repetitions and clutter are also part of what define the work. When looking at the mural, there are subtle 3-D elements almost like an expansion of the space. RAE said he was given new challenges working on this project. Usually when it comes to street art, brushes are his preferred tool but due to the sheer size of the wall and time constraints he was forced to use spray paint cans. RAE's bright and loud mural ads a new flare to the formally bland wall that sits across a vacant lot from Chloe's Home Cooking on East 156th street. Blending fine art with urban influences, RAE has created a mural that celebrates the Collinwood neighborhood as a crossroads of beauty and grit.

Pawn Works Street Art

It seems that every few days there is a new mural being painted by street artists from around the world in the Waterloo Arts District. This is in large part due to the efforts of Chicago based street art curators and facilitators Nick Marzullo and Seth Mooney who co-founded the group Pawn Works. The pair is helping find and bring the artists who paint the murals of the Zoetic Walls Project to the neighborhood.

Marzullo and Mooney, who are reaching out to all branches of the street art world, actually stem from local roots. Marzullo was born in Collinwood but grew up in Bainbridge Township. The partnership started with a gallery space and evolved into the full time curation of outdoor street art. Pawn Works now works with street artists to find walls, build hype for their shows, and help promote the art. They chose specific artists for specific spaces and are very conscious of what art goes where. Street art has been incredibly popular in Europe in recent years and that popularity is now coming to the United States. Pawn Works is playing a big role in making American street art happen. The group came to Collinwood when they were contacted by Amy Callahan at Arts Collinwood with her idea for the Zoetic Walls Project. Nick explained that he was "excited to be back working in Cleveland." He also talked about how "this project is all about bringing beauty to a neighborhood, letting people know this is an artistic and creative place." Pawn Works has been the irreplaceable middle man in this project bringing urban artists from around the world to paint within the Waterloo Arts District. In the weeks to come, they will bring even more artists to the neighborhood and growing its creative vibrancy.

Local Paint

It is the vision of street artists that have helped bring new murals to the Waterloo Arts District but it is the generosity of local companies that have helped to turn that vision into a reality. The golden paint used in the creation of the mural by the Detroit based art group the Hygienic Dress League was made possible with the help of Sheffield Bronze Paint Corporation located at 17814 South Waterloo Road and the Cleveland Paint Company at 855 East 222nd St. in Euclid. Sheffield manufactured the paint then sold the paint much below cost to the Cleveland Paint Company who donated their markup. As owner of Sheffield Paint, Mel Hart explained, "We try to help the city whenever we can...our company has a history of helping with projects and we like to stay true to that. We do the best we can for our neighborhood." The companies' generosity has also led to some spectacular colors appearing in Collinwood. The gold paint is traditionally used to paint the domes of churches. It looks so bright because it is not typically seen in such large quantities, or so close up. It is also a very safe paint with no dangerous toxins in it, a plus for neighborhood health. The help of these companies is a partnership of the old and the new, showing that newcomer artists and companies that have been in Cleveland for generations can work together all in the name of creating a better city.

Gaia Street Art

A blend of the urban landscape and fine art, that is what Baltimore based street artist Gaia displays in his new Waterloo mural. A young artist, who has already gained critical acclaim around the world, Gaia got his start making posters in New York and moved to wall murals as a way to do his art in a larger and more provocative way.

Gaia thinks big, but is also very aware of the neighborhoods in which he paints and the impact that his work has. Full of ideas and critiques on how to best deal with urban post industrialism, he hopes his art can be useful in the process of creative place-making and neighborhood rejuvenation. He

hopes his art can help inspire positive neighborhood change.

He also discusses trying to find a balance in his work, trying to be respectful of neighborhood residents without allowing his artistic vision to be manipulated.

In Collinwood, his aim is to create a mural that reinvigorates and has a cultural significance. Featuring an industrial landscape with fine art elements, the mural celebrates Cleveland's rich artistic and commercial histories and considers how they intertwine. As Gaia explained, "It is a metaphor of a new urban frontier." The mural's weaving of Cleveland strengths makes it a tribute to the city's past while also proposing an optimistic future.

Hygienic Dress League

"Wow that is a shiny building!" or 'What on earth is that" was probably the first reaction of most neighborhood residents when they saw the mural done by Detroit-based, husband and wife duo Steve and Dorota Coy, better known as the Hygienic Dress League. The mural on the northwest corner of Waterloo Road and E 156 St. features the group's signature gas mask and pigeon.

These images are used by the Hygienic Dress League as a means to discuss corporate manipulation and the constant bombardment of advertisement that consumers face every day. The mural serves a dual purpose however. While it is a cultural criticism, it is also intended to shock and inspire. On a Detroit radio

station, Steve explained that their work had a special intent, "To call attention to these spaces and maybe in some way incite people to do something with it. Ours is a temporary solution obviously, a city filled with our paintings on boarded up buildings is not going to solve much... but I think it's a really good start."

It is no secret that the area surrounding Waterloo faces a number of challenges but the Hygienic Dress League thinks that their art can help to spark conversation and inspire action in the effort to overcome neighborhood challenges. The mural will not be permanent and was done with the intent of beautifying a currently empty building until a new use is found. For now however, the golden mass will serve as a reminder from the Hygienic Dress League to consider our role as consumers and to care for the neighborhoods in which we live.

E. 156th Pocket Park is a place for everyone

The outdoors are a place for all of us to share and enjoy, no matter what our age. That was the thinking that inspired the ArtPlace: Play Space, a new pocket park located on East 156th Street next to the Northeast Shores building. Bringing together the elements of art, nature and play, the space is a unique crossroads where neighborhood characteristics collide into one space.

The small park features a walking path, radiant flowers, fruit trees, places to sit and play, and murals and sculptures from local artists. Quite the transformation from a formally vacant lot, "We are so excited about the project," said Brian Friedman, Executive Director at Northeast Shores. "This is about the re-imagination of spaces, taking underutilized areas in the neighborhood and creating something that

the whole community can enjoy."

The project was funded primarily through a grant from ArtPlace with design and implementation being carried out by LAND Studio, landscape architect Jim McKnight and local artist Mellissa Daubert. The newly opened park will provide an outdoor space where neighborhood residents can intermingle and enjoy the good weather. Melding arts, natural beauty and community togetherness, this space brings together all the elements that are most important to our neighborhood.

Ever Street Art

A Communist metaphor, a Rust Belt reimagining or just some guy, Argentinian street artist Ever's mural has a commanding presence as it watches over the intersection of Waterloo and E. 156th Street.

Ever is the first artist to paint as part of the Zoetic Arts Project. Hailing from Buenos Aires, Ever has painted murals around the world. He got his start (like many street artists) painting letters in his neighborhood back in the 1990's. As he evolved as an artist, he began to do more portraiture, often of people he does not even know.

His Collinwood mural is characteristic of his style as he juxtaposes the realistic with the totally abstract. His work is atypical of many street artists as such portraiture is not typically seen in the medium. Ever attempts to make his work relevant to North Collinwood residence as his images of tools and workers celebrate the rich industrial heritage and blue collar unity of the neighborhood.

There is no question that this has been one of the more controversial pieces of work to be done in the neighborhood but it has, through that controversy, brought about discussion and debate about art in the neighborhood and what is means for the Waterloo Arts District as a whole.

New season, big changes at Cavotta's Garden Center

Change is nothing new at the garden center on Nottingham Road that has served Collinwood and Euclid for three generations, but Angela Cavotta dug deep ahead of her 8th season as owner and made a lot of improvements to the business that's also her home.

It's a renewal that follows the loss of her dad, Fran, the longtime proprietor, who passed away in September.

"In January, I pulled into the parking lot and just sat and looked at the place. I thought, 'No more a little at a time, I'm getting old!' So I made some changes," she said, taking at break at a table near the vegetable tent.

New siding and some new windows on the house. A forty-by-forty concrete pad in front for flower sales, and a new high-tunnel hoop house in the back to grow heirloom tomatoes and peppers for sale in the fall.

"I went into debt. I haven't taken a vacation in 8 years, I'm here all the time. I want to fix this place up. The people are so awesome." If you're wondering how she has room

for all this, it helps to realize the property, while only 75' wide, is about two football fields deep, running all the way to Euclid Creek. The new hoop house actually replaced a greenhouse built by her grandfather, Felix Cavotta, in the 1930s. The other big greenhouse in the back dates to the 50s, it was still the 'new' greenhouse when she was a kid.



Angela puts together her love of gardening, plant arranging and collecting of vintage objects in the flower arrangements she has for sale.

"We all grew up here," she says, indicating the two-story house at the center of it all. "My dad and his brother and sisters, then us." That's Angela plus brother Francis and two sisters, Mary and Ruth.

The family have run Cavotta's Garden Center on Nottingham since the Great Depression. Her dad and uncle Mike took over when Angela was 14. They ran it together for a few years, then they split the business, with Uncle Mike doing landscaping next door, and Fran focusing on the retail side of the business.

"He grew everything he sold here on site. I used to come home from parties or wherever late at night and my dad would be out in the greenhouse. He just loved it, he loved the people."

Angela graduated from Collinwood High and pursued her own interests, worked other jobs and got into candy



making and vintage collectibles. When her brother took over the business in the 1990s, Angela would come to help out on the weekends. Then she started selling vintage stuff from the little barn that's now her chicken coop. Pretty soon she was here every weekend, and doing the year-round things like selling Christmas trees. She bought the business from Fran 8 years ago.

She's made little changes each year adding produce sales, replacing chain link with decorative fencing across the front. Moving the little barn to add hens, pouring a big concrete pad in the back to make the vegetable plant displays neat and tidy. She sells pumpkins, fall décor and Christmas trees, but also vintage collectables and an array of objets d'art made from cool old stuff that's caught her eye. She found a kids playhouse on Craigslist and now it's part of the goat enclosure. There's a flower garden growing in a chippy wrought iron bedstead. A new mural of the 'Watermelon Girl' from the vintage advertisement she uses on her business cards graces the inside of the produce pavilion out front.

Some might wonder how she had time to notice whether the house needed new siding.

"Every year I try to do something. The people are so awesome. I want this to be a really cool place, which I think it's becoming.'

Sitting in the late afternoon shade behind the herb house, she surveys her work in progress.

"I think I might be almost done." "Maybe."
