Cleveland Orchestra plays "Fairy Tales" at Memorial K-8 School



Principal Lori Rondo also credited Margaret Craig of the Northeast Shores Development Corporation for bringing the parties together for the performance.

Hundreds of Memorial K-8 students watched the concert, some sitting silently, but others actively conducting on their own or swaying and stomping to the different pieces.

"They need to move in order to really feel the music, I think," said first-grade teacher Stephanie Bluffstone, who taught her students to waltz and march in the weeks leading up to the performance by The Cleveland Orchestra. "There's a time for sitting still, too, but some of this music has to be felt.

Conductor Kelly Corcoran and The Cleveland Orchestra took the Memorial School students on a journey, bringing classical music and classic fairy tales to life in a one-hour performance in the school gymnasium.

Corcoran explained how music can function as "wordless stories" once you understand how certain instruments represent actions or characters in the fairy tale. "You'll hear the wicked step sisters awkwardly and clumsily practicing their steps — and that is the two solo violins," she told the audience, setting up "The Dancing Lesson" portion of "Cinderella" as the two violins purposely squawked out the cadence of the dance. Later, with animated hand motions and instrument

support, she described the seemingly chaotic festive march in the "Aladdin" piece: "You can imagine a big procession moving through, with elephants and camels and dancers. It's a great, big extravaganza!"

After opening with The Star-Spangled Banner, the 60-piece orchestra played through selected portions of Englebert Humperdinck's "The King's Children," Sergei Prokiev's "Cinderella," Maurice Ravel's "Mother Goose Suite" and Carl Nielsen's Aladdin before concluding with a rousing waltz from Tchaikovsky's "The Sleeping Beauty."

The concert, among a rare few the worldrenowned orchestra does outside Severance Hall or a similar concert hall, was made possible by a grant from the Alfred Lerner In-School Performance Fund. Memorial

Waterloo Sunoco – Common rumor going around is that the Waterloo Sunoco closed due to a reduction in business because of the Waterloo Streetscape. Actually, it wasn't the Waterloo Streetscape. It was a fire! On March 1, one of the coolers caught fire inside the Sunoco station. Thankfully, the Cleveland Fire Department was quick to respond and put out the electrical fire.

The truth is that the 7-11 was an independent franchise that lost its franchise agreement when the East 185th Street BP opened a corporatebacked 7-11 inside the BP (and removed the Subway sandwich shop, by the way). Corporate would not allow there to be two 7-11 convenience stores on East 185th Street. After the operator lost his franchise, the building owner elected not to renew the lease and put the building on the market. Recently, the building was purchased and will open as an independent convenience store called Quix Food and Deli.

A few weekends ago Phone Gallery - Cleveland's Smallest Gallery - opened it's first curated show, #ThisisWaterloo, a revolving set of crowd-sourced photographs taken by visitors, residents, and merchants in the

In the shadows of Russ' Auto, I stood in front of the once vacant, phoneless box and tinkered with the format of the first 16 photographs now on view through mid-May when a new batch of photographs will replace the initial selections. I drew the attention of curious on-lookers and happily chatted about the project's aspirations to engage any and everyone who finds themselves on Waterloo. Not once but twice I was offered the use of a stranger's cell phone

pay phone. I can only imagine how bizarre I looked, reaching through the wormhole for a phone receiver that is long gone.

Originally conceived in 2013 through collaboration between artist Ivana Medukic of 'Project Pop-Up Galleries' and myself and executed by neighborhood handyman Doug Holmes, Phone Gallery demonstrates the transformation of an otherwise underutilized "space" into an inventive place for art display.

It's mission is to exhibit neighborhoodcentric work by local artists, promoting Collinwood and its people to Cleveland and bevond. For the first exhibition, the goal is to engage people who otherwise might not describe themselves as artists or might not otherwise find time to visit Waterloo.

In fact, the intention for all of my community-led, interactive arts projects coming to North Collinwood (LOCKS of Love, from Waterloo; YARN n YOGA; and more) is to convey how accessible making art can be. "Smart" cell phones are prolific: We use them as substitutes for alarm clocks, handheld gamers, and cameras. It's the latter function I am interested in, especially as a tool to promote the wonderful emerging arts scene brewing in Collinwood.

Playing off of Positively Cleveland's newest campaign, #ThisisCLE, #ThisisWaterloo encourages people to document their experiences in the Waterloo Arts District and promote them to each other, greater Cleveland, and beyond. We are our own

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Around Collinwood

The NEORSD project on Lakeshore Blvd.

The Northeast Ohio Regional Sewer District (NEORSD) is doing a massive sewer project on Lakeshore Blvd., at the cost of over \$10 million dollars. The residents of the area need to know what is going on and

I recently spoke with a sewer worker who said huge machines with whirling blades will tear up Lakeshore Blvd., from Neff Rd.

Some of the trees will be in the way, because the blades are so wide, so the trees are marked with pink "X's" to be removed. This does not make any sense, because tele-

phone poles next to the trees are the same distance from the street as the trees, and are not going to be cut down. Why is the NEORDS planning to chop down our trees, and not the telephone poles? Will they replace them?

How will this affect residents, and traffic? Will residents still be able to take the bus? (The Lakeshore busses are the #39 and #30, and the #39, runs the length of Lakeshore Blvd. Will parts of Lakeshore Blvd., be closed down, and traffic be rerouted?

This project is supposed to last all summer long, and the water will be shut off for a day. When and why?? How will residents be notified?

NEORSD needs to tell the public what is going on, and why they say sewer lines are being replaced because of flooding. My apartment on Lakeshore Blvd has never flooded, in the basement for the 8 years I have been here. So how prevalent and serious is this flooding?

The questions that should be answered in The Observer for all residents, are:

Who started this project? Why is it being done? Who is financing it? Will the whirling blades cause flying debris, which could injure residents or their homes? What will happen to our trees, and why are the telephone poles not affected? Will new trees be planted in their place? How will this project affect residents and traffic on Lakeshore Blvd.? Will the RTA bus routes still be able travel on Lakeshore Blvd.? Does this project just affect Lakeshore Blvd., or the side streets, also? Will certain streets be blocked off, or traffic rerouted? Will mail delivery be affected? Will water and electricity be interrupted? How will residents be notified? How can residents get involved, and learn more, or sign petitions to save our trees? And if there is a public meeting, will it be located in an accessible place, on a bus line

What is the name of the project? The project is called the Euclid Creek Pump Station - Lakeshore Boulevard Relief Sewer

What is the purpose of the project?

The purpose of the project is to increase sewer capacity in the area and update the

Currently, during a rain event, the existing sewer cannot contain the flows and, as a result, untreated wastewater is discharged into the environment. This happens approximately 40 times per year.

After construction is completed, when the current sewer becomes too full during a rain event, flows will be redirected to the new Lakeshore Boulevard Relief Sewer Those flows will then be diverted to the Euclid Creek Tunnel where it will be stored until it can be treated at the Easterly Wastewater Treatment Plant. Sewer discharges will be reduced from 40 times a typical year to zero. 27 million gallons of former sewage discharges to the environment will be captured and fully treated each year.

Additionally, the project may alleviate some basement flooding as long as the local system can convey the flow to the relief

Where will the work be located?

A sewer will be constructed from Triangle Park to the intersection of Lakeshore Boulevard & Rosecliff Avenue. There will be additional sewers located along East Park Drive and Crestland Road.

Will it reduce all basement flooding? The Sewer District's project is limited to the sewer pipes and pump station that are owned by the Sewer District. The City of

Cleveland WPC also owns and maintains sewers in this area, including the local storm and sanitary sewers. While the Sewer District's work may reduce some basement flooding, it is not expected to resolve all basement flooding issues in this area. Larger storms can still overwhelm the sewer system and cause flooding issues.

If you have questions about other sewer projects planned for the local sewer system in the area, please call the City of Cleveland Department of Water Pollution Control (WPC) at 216-664-2750.

How much will the project cost?

The Lakeshore Boulevard Relief Sewer costs \$10.35 million, which includes upgrades to the Euclid Creek Pump Station.

Who will pay for the project? Sewer District projects are paid for by our customers through sewer fees.

Are grants available to help cover the costs? Through 1991, the Sewer District received grant monies. Unfortunately, those grants monies no longer exist.

How will this affect residents, and traffic? The work will progress northbound on Lakeshore Boulevard starting at Marcella Road. Lakeshore Boulevard will be reduced from four lanes to two lanes where the work is being performed.

On East Park Drive and Crestland, there will be no curb side parking. Traffic will be reduced to local access only; traffic will be flagged through the area. Residents will have access to their driveways. At the completion of the work, the area will be restored to its previous state including new pavement throughout the work area, and replacement of curbs and sidewalks where necessary

I'm concerned about the safety of the project. Should the residents be concerned about the large whirling blades used to cut the street? The Sewer District wants to assure residents that safety is a priority, and this is a safe project. The equipment used during excavation is standard (a track mounted excavator to dig the sewer trench, and trucks to haul spoils and backfill); it does

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not include the use of large whirling blades. Additionally, the work will be done behind concrete barriers and fencing. As with any construction project, the contractor is required to follow all safety regulations.

Will trees need to be removed? If so, why? Will new trees be replaced? How about telephone poles?

Yes, in the fall of 2014, 12 trees will need to be removed on East Park Drive. However, the contractor may elect to work on the street sooner than scheduled, so the trees may be removed prior to the fall of 2014.

The Sewer District has consulted with an Arborist with the City of Cleveland and determined that the location of the work required to build the new sewer would result in damage to the existing trees and their roots such that the trees would not likely survive. Therefore, they will need to be removed. At the completion of the project, for each tree removed, two new new trees will be planted in its place.

The telephone poles will remain intact. Fortunately, unlike trees which have roots, the excavator can work around the telephone poles.

Will bus routes be impacted?

Bus routes will be minimally impacted. Drop off and pick up locations may vary slightly depending on the current work location and because of the reduced number of lanes.

Will water and electricity be impacted? If so, for how long? How will residents be notified?

There are some utilities lines that will need to be relocated, and those utility compa-

nies are in the process of relocating those lines. Outages, particularly power outages, should not occur during excavation.

Further, the Sewer District does not anticipate any water service interruptions. However, if interruptions are necessary, proper notification will be given.

Will mail delivery be impacted? No, mail delivery will not be impacted.

What are the conditions of the old sewer line that will redirect flow into the new Lakeshore Boulevard Relief Sewer?

The existing sewer is in good condition However, it does not have the capacity to sufficiently handle flows during rain events. For this reason the Sewer District is constructing the relief sewer - to provide relief to the existing sewer.

What about Lake Erie dredging?

The Sewer District is not involved with the projects related to dredging the Cuyahoga River and dumping of the materials into the open waters of Lake Erie. For additional information on dredging, please call the Ohio EPA or the Army Corp of Engineers.

When will the project be completed?

The construction of the ECPS-LBRS project will be substantially complete by November of 2015. However, the relief sewer will not begin operating until September 2016. The date, however, is contingent on the completion of the Euclid Creek Tunnel construction (the relief sewer will direct sewage into the tunnel) and the Tunnel Dewatering Pump Station.

VASJ begins renovation of 64-year old gym

The old bleachers will be replaced with state-of-the-art, molded plastic seats from the Hussey Seating Company, boasting a capacity of 1,250 seats with end and back railing, along with and aisle railway, giving a college-like atmosphere to the gym with an obvious upgrade that will advance both the safety and aesthetics

The stage will have platform risers in front, creating VIP seating with cushioned folding chairs, adding an exciting new cheering section behind the basket with a great vantage

The banners, a daily reminder of all of the storied accomplishments of past and present Vikings, will also see a new look. There will be a consistent color and theme, with new Final Four, State Championship and branding banners adorning the rafters.

The restrooms in the gym will also be enlarged to accommodate the large crowds, becoming ADAcompliant. In doing so, space will be created for new concession stands and a Spirit Shop will be added to the Viking Village. Replacing the metal railings above the north end bleachers, will be sleek, new, glass five-feetwide panels with stainless steel rails. The glass will be branded with VASJ logos as well as provide advertising opportunities. The current and current scoreboard advertising will also be renegotiated. Finally, the basketball hoops will become suspended from the ceiling rather than movable posts.

First-year Athletic Director Nate Zavorek '94, has spearheaded the effort

"We have all reaped the benefits of this gym," said Zavorek. "Now it is time to give back and give this special place, which has housed so many memories, a face lift. This gym has shaped the growth from adolescence to adulthood for many of the people who walked these walls and I think all of those people want to see it being taken care of and upgraded for future generations to enjoy just as much."

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Grants Awarded to Hospice School Crisis Response Program

Hospice of the Western Reserve has received continued grant funding of its School Crisis Response Program from the Ridgecliff Foundation (\$25,000) and the Pentair Foundation (\$1,325) in 2014. Both foundations have provided annual support since 2007, enabling the experienced counselors of the nonprofit agency's Elisabeth Severance Prentiss Bereavement Center to respond to students and staff when deathrelated crises occur in Northeast Ohio's school communities.

In the period of 2007 through 2013, counselors provided 150 immediate onsite responses in the aftermath of suicides, shootings, accidental deaths, unexpected sudden deaths, and anticipated deaths due to serious illness. Each crisis response is carefully planned in coordination with the school's staff, to fit the specific needs of the impacted school community.

"We're grateful for this continued support, which allows our team of trained counselors to provide immediate, on-site

support for administrators, staff, students and parents in collaboration with school crisis response team members," said Diane Snyder Cowan, Director of the Elisabeth Severance Prentiss Bereavement Center.

The school crisis response team helps the students develop a normalized view of the grief process, find appropriate ways to express their feelings, and memorialize the deceased. After the initial response, many schools invite the counselors back to lead follow-up activities such as grief support groups and classroom presentations.

The Elisabeth Severance Prentiss Bereavement Center's School Crisis Response Program supplements the programs and resources already available in schools. "We offer proactive consultation services, and presentations on the grief responses of children and adolescents for teachers and school staff," Snyder Cowan said. It's peaceful here now. One would never

suspect that only a few days ago it was the scene of a military funeral. That was the day they brought you home, this time to stay. They brought you across the ocean in a large ship with others like yourself. As you came toward the dock the tug whistle remained silent a quiet salute to you. They lifted you gently to the pier, then to a train and then they bore you up here. You're home now. It's peaceful here now. The rifles are silent, the people gone, and you are left to rest. Was it quiet then, on that day they laid you to rest?

It's beautiful up here today. The sun is warm on your grave and trees are whispering softly that your sleep may not be disturbed. They are not mourning for you, they're raising their branches, tall and straight to give thanks that we have men like you. You died to protect this land, this tree, this country, and all of us. Your were called on to do a job, and you did it, at the expense of your own life "that this nation under God shall have a new birth of freedom" Freedom isn't fee. It's peaceful here today. "Let not your heart be trouble, ye believe in God." You did not die in vain. There are those who would have believed it, but you did not die in vain.

I bought a newspaper tonight, several

as a matter of fact. I read of the corrupt administration in some place and of the good in other cities. I was able to get a true picture of our country. That is why you did not die in vain. We will go to the polls to vote and elect new officials. The officials of our own choice. This is why you did not die in vain. Sunday I will go to church, the church I choose and will worship God in the way I see fit. This is why you didn't die in vain. I can go to a civic meeting and criticize or praise our country and its administration. I can say what I think and feel. This is why you did not die in vain.

All this is America, and this is why you did not die in vain, for we still have these things, thanks to you. But you say what of yourself? You are not dead for your soul lives on in the hearts of your loved ones, and in those who pass by here and look at your white cross. You are an inspiration for those coming on after you. Your strength, courage, and devotion to your country are examples to be followed carefully. For you are on of those who "more than self their country loved."

It's peaceful here today. But down in the cities and towns the people are going about their work. The work of making this nation, this world, a better place in which to live. You have finished your work, so rest well soldier, it's a job well done. And when God feels that we have done our jobs, we will come to join you in the sleep that only one who has done a good job can have. You've done your job, but we will continue in your line and try to finish it.
