Over the last month and a half a recurring theme I am hearing from neighborhood residents throughout the Northeast side, which includes the East Glenville area, is "where are the street repair crews and does the Public Works Department still have street sweepers?" Good question.

I, like you, am still searching for the mysterious "pothole killer" and at this point will take any street repair crew to address the street conditions on the northeast side of the City. In all my years in Public office I have never seen city streets in such poor condition. I am beginning to classify street sweepers in the "Urban Legend" category - in fact, I am expecting to have an encounter with Big Foot along Euclid Creek before I see a street sweeper on the northeast side.

If this wasn't so serious, and in the case with chuckholes, so dangerous, it would be laughable. However, when residents and motorists tear up their cars and do major damage - it isn't funny. The City Department of Public Works has really let our citizens down in a big way by not having a meaningful game plan in place to deal with the road conditions in light of the severe winter we had experienced.

Residents are fed up and don't want to hear about more tax dollars for the Cleveland Browns and million dollar chandeliers on Euclid Avenue. They, and I, expect a reasonable response to neighborhood quality of life issues. Quite frankly, it is not

"My intention of adding a new sculpture is to beautify the already amazing Water-



Frank Brancato on trial for the Porrello murders

As time and people pass, new publications are now coming out regarding Cleveland's and Collinwood's more infamous history. I picked up two recently published biographies which both touch on the neighborhood's most well known mobster, Danny

The first was "Feritto, An Assassin Scorned" regarding Ray Ferritto written by his widow, Susan DeSantis-Ferritto. Though out of Erie, Pennsylvania, he made many connections with Collinwood's transplanted criminal element while living in California, such as Jimmy "the Weasel" Fratianno, Julius Petro, Frank "Skinny" Velotta, Bob Walsh, and Phil Christopher.

the Los Angeles airport in 1969. During the power struggle for control of the Cleveland mob in 1976, there would be 37 car bombing in Cuyahoga County. After several failed attempts to eliminate Danny Greene. it would be Fratianno who would recommend Ray for the hit to the then head of the Cleveland mafia, James Licavoli. The second is "Brancato, Mafia Street

Boss" written by his grandson Frank Monastra. Frank Brancato is acknowledged as responsible for a number of murders in Cleveland's corn sugar wars during Prohibition, including that of the Porrello brother's who then controlled the illegal liquor trade, on the behest of the Mayfield Road Mob's Frank Milano. Though John Scalish was head of Cleveland's mafia from 1944 until his death in 1976, Brancato was the one people would deal with directly on

Ferritto and Walsh would later be contracted and kill Petro in the parking lot of

It was Brancato who took notice of Danny Greene in the clubs, and who recruited him as first a collector/enforcer, as the leader of Cleveland's Longshoreman's Union 1317, and later in the attempt to organize and control independent waste collectors.

On Tuesday, June 3, the Lee-Miles neighborhood came out in numbers to the Harvard Community Services Center on Tuesday evening for the third of 14 open houses that District officials will use to finalize a master facilities plan.

The Lee-Miles area is among a dozen "clusters" where CMSD is holding open houses on different scenarios, or options, for construction, renovation and maintenance of buildings. The scenarios were displayed around the room, along with demographics and other facts about the area.

Residents discussed scenarios and much more with key CMSD officials, including Chief Executive Officer Eric Gordon, Chief Operating Officer Patrick Zohn, Chief Academic Officer Michelle Pierre-Farid and others.

Ward 1 Councilman Councilman Terrell Pruitt told his constituents: "CMSD is in the midst of a transformation, and we're all part of the process."

"These are generational decisions - decisions that will last for the next 40 years," he said. "These decisions you will help make will have a major impact on our commu-

The open houses follow a previous round of 14 community sessions, a survey that drew 900 responses and a telephone poll of 2,700 voters. The District also consulted City Council members and religious and philanthropic leaders.

Gordon has said the revised plan places more emphasis than ever on what the community wants, and he reminded the crowd Tuesday that input from previous sessions has already made a very real difference in the District's planning.

"We have already changed the scenarios from meetings in clusters we have had, based on the feedback," he said.

"This is by no means a done recommendation," he added. "But this is a key part of the process, so then I can go back to the board (the Board of Education) and say that after many, many ways of trying to capture feedback, this is what we believe is the best for working with every community in our neighborhoods."

The districtwide scenarios, released at the end of May, suggest building 19 schools, while closing four or five and relocating or replacing several others. Planners honored the public's wishes to keep closings to a minimum and spare high schools altogether.

The five-year plan, which is subject to approval by the Board of Education, would complete a building program begun more than a decade ago. It would continue work after state money that has typically covered two-thirds of the cost of construction and renovation runs out.

To pay for new projects, the Board would, in effect, ask voters to extend property-tax payments they agreed to when they passed Issue 14 in 2001. The current levy will drop significantly in January 2015.

The District is trying to maximize efficiency, save on operating expenses and respond to declining enrollment while also ensuring quality school options in every neighborhood -- a promise central to The Cleveland Plan, CMSD's state-approved blueprint for reform.

Gordon ordered that the building plan be flexible so the District could downsize if enrollment continues to shrink and acreverses the trend.

The board could vote on a final plan June 24, but would have until Aug. 6 to place tax issues on the November ballot.

The tax issues would raise \$200 million. Gordon said the amount includes money to finish the job started with Issue 14, maintain schools and, where possible, build features like auditoriums and athletic fields that the community wants but the state

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VASJ students help revitalize E. 185th Street

It was announced in March that an \$88,000 grant was awarded for the revitalization of East 185th Street. A group of nine VASJ seniors had the unique opportunity to conduct research and make recommendations for the

The students in the Functions and Statistics class taught by Mr. Gary Minadeo '74 partnered with Cleveland State University's College of Urban Affairs for their senior project – research in support of the redevelopment of East 185th Street.

Throughout the semester, the students conducted surveys of the street to collect analytical data to be used to offer recommendations to the Northeast Shores Development Corp. for ways to use the grant to improve the street.

"The students really impressed me with the way they took ownership of the project," said Minadeo. "They started to see it as 'their project' and 'their street.'

Minadeo is committed to making sure the project doesn't lose momentum and is already exploring ways he can work the redevelopment of East 185th Street into next year's curriculum.



Focus on Life-long Learning

by Dr. Peter Whitehouse From its inception The Intergenerational School has focused on life-long learning. Although as public charter schools the principal focus of the three intergenerational schools is the education of children, we have created rich learning opportunities for adults of all ages. Many of our signature programs feature elders but we also include younger adults such as undergraduates and professional students from Case Western Reserve University as well as various other colleges and universi-

Our children interact with elders from the community as well as those living in residential facilities. Our signature program involves our Reading Mentors. Older adults share

reading and storytelling paired with children one-on-one from the same classroom. This allows building relationships and mutual appreciation over long periods of time. Other intergenerational programs include working with computers, music, arts, and gardens. We emphasize learning experiences ideally with service components that are engaging for learners of all ages. For almost our entire existence we have

had groups of nursing students conduct their service learning projects in the school. We focus on interdisciplinary and interprofessional learning whenever we can. We use a variety of information technology approaches from virtual reality, to games, the use of broad band, and the Microsoft Kinect to foster physical movement. A major focus of our intergenerational programs is the environment and includes working with local nature centers and gardens. We include older adults with mild to moderate cognitive challenges like recent memory loss. Our published research demonstrates the value of learning experiences in our school for these older adults who keep their own minds active and also contribute to their community in this way. Ultimately though, our schools celebrate not the individual value of intergenerational experiences to people of different ages but the power of bringing the life experiences of multiple generations together in service of human flourishing for the long-term.

CMSD seeks comments on building proposals

Options that the Cleveland Metropolitan School District has proposed for District buildings would preserve schools in the Collinwood neighborhood and perhaps replace one with new construction.

CMSD is holding a series of open houses to answer questions and field comments on possible scenarios for construction, renovation and maintenance. The schedule includes a session that will run from 5:30 to 7:30 p.m. Wednesday, June 18 at Collinwood High School.

The proposals call for maintaining Ginn Academy and Kenneth W. Clement Boys' Leadership Academy and possibly building a 350-seat replacement for O.H. Perry School. The document also proposes continuing to operate four schools -- East Clark, Euclid Park, Hannah Gibbons STEM and Memorial -- built since 2005.

Collinwood High School would stay open, and the district would try to boost enrollment. The proposals point to potential for increasing the number of high-performing programs in the school and suggest discussing how parts of the building may be used for neighborhood development.

The District is trying to maximize efficiency, save on operating expenses and respond to declining enrollment while also ensuring quality school options in every neighborhood -- a promise central to The Cleveland Plan, a blueprint for reform.

The open houses will help finalize a five-year plan that the Board of Education could vote on June 24.

The plan, which is subject to approval by the Board of Education, would complete a building program that the state and CMSD began more than a decade ago. To pay for new projects, the Board would, in effect, ask voters to extend property-tax payments they agreed to when they passed Issue 14 in 2001.

The board would have until Aug. 6 to place a tax issue on the November ballot Thomas Ott is director of the CMSD News Bureau.

Cats Indoors: Better For Cats, Better For Birds, Better For People

I applaud the efforts of concerned citizens working to reduce cat overpopulation, but feel that the Trap/Neuter/Re-Abandon (TNR) program does not resolve all of the problems associated with stray and feral

Cat overpopulation is a human-caused tragedy that affects the health and wellbeing of cats, our native wildlife and the public. Outdoor cats, even well-fed ones, kill hundreds of millions of wild birds and other animals each year in the U.S., including endangered species. Birds that nest or feed on the ground are especially vulnerable to cat attacks. I painfully watch them ambush and kill native species in my yard, including goldfinches. I try to attract native birds and wildlife to my yard as sanctuary for them. TNR is not humane to cats or wildlife. Free-roaming cats are in constant danger of being hit by cars, contracting diseases and parasites, or being attacked by other animals or people. Cats can transmit diseases to humans such as rabies, toxoplasmosis (an infection from cats that makes pregnant women have dead

babies or birth defects - affects first trimester), and cat scratch fever. In the U.S., cats are the top carrier of rabies in domestic animals. Trap/Neuter/Re-Abandon is also ineffective at reducing cat populations because not all of the cats can be trapped and spay/neutered, and food left out for them attracts more cats. Colonies develop and become dumping grounds for unwanted pets, thus continuing the inhumane cycle. In addition, the food also attracts rats, carriers of diseases such as rabies which can be transmitted to humans. People concerned about the welfare of feral cats should work to find homes for them, and help EDU-CATE pet owners about spaying and neutering their pets, KEEPING THEIR CATS INDOORS, and the ethical and wildlife issues associated with cat abandonment. Abandoning cats is illegal in many areas, and it is extremely cruel to cats, AND TO BIRDS. All cats should wear bells to warn any of their unwary prey.
