morning in November, nearly 50 local cyclists gathered at the Beachland Ballroom in Cleveland for the third annual "Cranksgiving." It is a nationally renowned bicycle event that usually takes place the Saturday before Thanksgiving. Cleveland is one of 70 cities nationwide that hosts this event, including Los Angeles, Miami, New York City, and Washington, DC.

The objective of the event was to spend up to \$15 on canned goods and non-perishables and bicycle 15 total miles to local grocery stores. The travel itinerary included grocery stores in Cleveland's North Collinwood neighborhood, most of Euclid's local grocery stores, and as far east as Shoregate Shopping Center in Willowick. This included both Dave's Supermarket locations along Lakeshore Boulevard, Shwebel's Bakery Outlet on E. 200th Street, and Giant Eagle in Willowick. This was the third year in a row Cranksgiving happened, and was the first time that Cranksgiving came to the northeastern side of town. Last year it took place in Cleveland's West Park neighborhood, which also encompassed Fairview Park, Rocky River, and Lakewood.

"We organize the event each year not only for the cycling community to help feed hungry families during the holiday season," says Jeffrey Sugalski, the Cranksgiving coordinator through the local bicycle nonprofit Bike Cleveland, about the general purpose of Cranksgiving. Cyclists bought generous amounts of food to be split among local hunger centers within the Hunger Network of Greater Cleveland. Cranksgiving was successful with raising an estimated value of \$2,500 in food. "It is also to demonstrate that cyclists can do many of the things that motorists do, including grocery shop on one of the busiest shopping days of the year," says Sugalski about the importance Cranksgiving is to Cleveland's growing bicycle community. This is important as commuting by bicycle is becoming a popular means of commuting in major cities nationwide. It is also an opportunity for cyclists to give back to the community and provide food for those less fortunate while giving thanks.

by Monica Doyle During the month of October, over 17 cats were killed and 2 seriously maimed by a pack of roaming dogs in the North Collinwood/Euclid Beach neighborhood. More cats are missing and presumed dead.

Animal Control trapped 2 roaming dogs within the target area and found the owner who had a total of 5 adult dogs and 9 pup-

pies. The owner relinquished ownership of the dogs to Animal Control and now faces any legal charges that can be laid against him.

"You need surgery." Words no one wants to hear, but there is a good chance we will all need surgery of some kind during our lifetime. For those with other health problems, the likelihood may increase and the risk certainly does. This is particularly true for people with liver disease, including cirrhosis — a slowly progressive disease in which healthy liver tissue is replaced with scar tissue, eventually preventing the liver from functioning properly

Charles Winans, MD, a Cleveland Clinic abdominal organ transplant surgeon, also has an interest in general surgery for high-risk patients, including those with liver disease. He performs surgery on these high-risk patients at Cleveland Clinic main campus and Euclid Hospital.

"Cirrhotic patients develop hernias, for example, due to the accumulation of ascites, or fluid in the belly," says Dr. Winans. "A construction worker may develop a hernia from straining due to constant heavy lifting. In those with cirrhosis, constant pressure from the fluid can cause a hernia." Medication and minimally invasive procedures may help in some cases. However, when surgery is needed, there are added complications for cirrhotic patients. Common procedures like removal of the gallbladder are harder, and entail greater risk both during the operation and recovery. Dr. Winans often is called in when internists or general surgeons recognize the situation is more complex.

"It's important for referring physicians and patients to be aware that this highly specialized level of surgical care — for conditions that can often go undiagnosed or may be considered untreatable — is available right here in the community," says Dr. Winans. "Euclid Hospital offers innumerable conveniences to patients and family members along with the extremely high level of care for which Cleveland Clinic is known."

Unified Martial Arts Academy Open

"I come to you with empty hands, I have not weapons, but should I be forced to defend myself, my principles or my honor, should it be a matter of life or death, or right or wrong, then here are my weapons, karate, my empty

These words appear on one of the many Hall of Fame plaques earned by Grandmaster Joel Dvorin, owner of Unified Martial Arts Academy located at 686 East 185th St, Cleve-

Under the direction of Grandmaster Joel Dvorin, Master Harvey Fierman and Master Sean Southwick, Unified Martial Arts teaches a combination of Tae Kwon Do, Kempo and Judo, with students ranging in age from 5 to 50, Grandmaster Dvorin has black belts in Tae Kown Do and Kempo, and is the North American President of the Unified Martial Arts Federation and the Founder of TJBMA and has 60 years in the martial arts. Master Harvey Fierman has over 40 years of training and teaching in art of Judo. Master Sean Southwick has over 20 years of Tae Kwon Do Training and Teaching and after living in Israel has been trained in Krav

The academy teaches different styles each concentrating on a specific discipline, Tae Kwon Do is made up with 60-70% of leg and foot techniques, Kempo is over 60% hand and arm techniques and Judo consists of throws, takedowns, chocks, locks along with learning how to fall and roll properly. These forms complement one another, Unified Martial Arts can teach self-defense within a short period of time, even though it takes years to become a black belt.

Levels of knowledge are indicated by belt ranking, from white belt to Black belt. There are 10 colored belts and 10 black belts. Each is reached by showing knowledge of the basic techniques for that belt ranking.

Students also learn kata's (prearranged fighting forms) sparring and the use of weapons such as the bow, sword, sai's and kama's. The academy does not advocate fighting, but teaches students "street wise martial arts" if a student finds him or herself in a dangerous situation. The academy also does many tournaments during the year.

The biggest challenge in the martial arts for young or old is that the martial arts is a year long commitment and must be worked in with other sports that children want to do during the year. Unified Martial Arts is open 6 days a week and also offers private lessons during the day.
