State and Local Officials Gather to Recognize HGR for its Contribution to Ohio Manufacturing

On Oct. 1, HGR Industrial Surplus celebrated Manufacturing Day with a site-dedication ceremony and customer appreciation sale that included 20 to 50 percent off most items in the showroom and resulted in more than 225 people visiting and one of the company's top sales days.

Customers began to arrive before 7:30 a.m. to shop for used industrial surplus goods, including one whose mother built GM auto bodies at the facility. Guests continued to arrive for the 11 a.m. dedication ceremony emceed by Mark "Munch" Bishop of WKNR 850 AM, who shared a brief history of the site before turning the floor over to Brian Krueger, one of HGR's owners who introduced many honored guests.

Euclid Mayor Bill Cervenik acknowledged the \$10-12 million of improvements that HGR has begun making to the fire system, roof and parking lot, saying, "I remember dodging chuckholes as big as your car in the lot when it was owned by the previous landlord." Council President Kirsten Holzheimer-Gale said a few words and introduced Ward 1 Councilwoman Stephana C. Caviness, as well as Pearletha Taylor, president of the Heritage Park Neighborhood Association, then presented HGR with a friendship plaque from the city. Krueger acknowledged Cheryl Stephens of the Cuyahoga Land Bank who helped negotiate the site acquisition.

Christopher Diehl, Cleveland city architect and board member of Ingenuity Cleveland, invited guests to Ingenuity Festival, Oct. 2-4, and introduced the two artists competing in the first Iron Architect competition to build a unique seating environment using some materials and equipment from HGR's showroom. Matt Fieldman of Manufacturing Advocacy Growth Network (MAGNET) announced the STEAM Resource Center, to be housed in HGR's customer lounge, which will provide information on manufacturing organizations and careers.

Bob Torelli, Euclid High School Science Department chair, introduced some members of the Euclid High School Robotics Team, who later demonstrated their competition battle robot, and accepted an award, from HGR, on behalf of the team to recognize its outstanding accomplishments in the 2015 AWT Northeast Ohio Regional RoboBots Competition. Torelli says of the team members' dedication, "They met twice per week, including three hours every Saturday morning from November through April. They had to learn CAD, the gear ratio for belts, how to program motors, how to

problem solve weight issues and, most importantly, how to work together."

Finally, Eric Synenberg, from Ohio Treasurer Josh Mandel's office, issued a proclamation acknowledging HGR's contribution to manufacturing and its participation in National Manufacturing Day, after which Sheila Gibbons of the Euclid Chamber of Commerce produced large scissors for the official ribbon-cutting ceremony in front of the new Nickel Plate Station site-timeline wall before everyone adjourned to enjoy lunch together at tables set up in the showroom.

From Summer Estate to State of the Art Rehab

In 1942, The Sisters of St. Joseph of St. Mark bought the 25 acre estate on Chardon Hill from the family of Henry Pickands. Pickands was the heir to the Pickands Mather Company, pioneers in the Great Lakes shipping and mining industries. The order of Catholic sisters began to provide rest home services for residents of the area in the large, white, Neo-Georgian-style dwelling that was on the estate property. Of the fifty sisters in the ministry at the time, some were sent to nursing school to be able to better provide medical care to their patients. The rest home soon outgrew the capacity of the house, and in the 1950s, the Sisters raised money, and built a 100bed nursing facility in increments. This home was called Mount Saint Joseph.

The Sisters have continuously provided excellent nursing care despite their aging facility. At the end of 2012, through the guidance and hard work of Mother Mary Raphael Gregg, the Mother Superior of the order, they were able to replace their nursing facility with a new, state of the art rehabilitation center. Mount St. Joseph Nursing Home became Mount St. Joseph Rehab Center and now also provides short-term rehabilitation with a full staff of nurses, physical therapists, occupational therapists and speech therapists. The beautiful facility boasts private rooms, a sunny courtyard, on-site Mass, and daily social activities.

Councilman Polensek's Letter to Senator Portman concerning Water Quality

constituents and the people of Cleveland in regards to the ongoing Lake Erie water quality issue on the northeast side of the City of Cleveland.

Yesterday was Labor Day, a national holiday and the traditional end of summer, when countless numbers of families come together to celebrate the greatness of the American worker. In our own community families flock to the lakefront to picnic and to, hopefully, enjoy the lake.

However, over this magnificent weekend, families and their children were not allowed to swim at Euclid Beach and Villa Angela Beach MetroParks, because of the high levels of ecoli. It hasn't rained now for well over a week and the water in Euclid Creek itself is "as clear as drinking water." I live on the Creek and can attest to that on a daily basis. Something is terribly wrong in America when families cannot enjoy the amenities of the lake except "at their own risk" in 2015.

The Great Lakes account for 80% of the fresh water in the United States, so I am told. Yet, the waters off the shores of Cleveland have extremely high levels of ecoli. Now, the waters in the western basin of the lake are being contaminated with deadly blue-green algae, which, as we all know, recently affected the water quality for the City of Toledo and surrounding areas.

Getting back to the northeast side, residents, community activists and this Councilman are demanding answers. There has been no rain and no storms and yet the quality of our lake water is hazardous to one's personal health and that of

their families. Having represented this lakefront community for many years, I have heard all the alleged suspects from illegal discharges from surrounding suburbs, illegal sanitary tie-ins to Euclid Creek, illegal storm discharges, industrial waste, inadequate sanitary sewers, and the best yet, "excessive bird fecal matter" from too many geese along the lakefront and in Euclid Creek.

This is not cutting it any longer in the community or with this councilman. Therefore, I am OFFICIALLY requesting, through your office that a Federal investigation be taken by the US Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) to find out, once and for all, as to what is causing this contamination to happen in our community. This is America, not a third-world nation. We should be able to use Lake Erie for our recreation and entertainment without fear of becoming seriously ill or worse.

If it is illegal tie-ins, dye testing in the Euclid Creek watershed should be able to determine this. If it is other illegal tie-ins or discharges, then a thorough investigation in partnership with the Northeast Ohio Regional Sewer District (NEORSD) should be able to determine the culprit locations. If it is truly the geese, then let's figure out what to do with them in a humane manner.

In closing, this should be a national embarrassment and outrage as to what is happening and should be a wakeup call. I am outraged but I don't regulate the Ohio EPA or the US EPA. The Federal Government

does. The US EPA needs to protect our eco-systems and especially our fresh water. Quite frankly, I don't believe they are doing either.

I am personally appealing to you with the hope that you can understand the injustice here. Euclid Beach and Villa Angela Beach of the Cleveland MetroParks system are the only swimming beaches on the entire east side of the City of Cleveland. Our folks don't belong to country clubs and for the most part cannot afford to take their kids to the high-end water parks, ie Sandusky or elsewhere. They take their children to the city pools when open or put a sprinkler on in their yard; many don't even do that anymore for fear of increasing their already high water bills. The lakefront is their real watering hole; just as it was when I was a child. In fact, Lake Erie is our State's greatest natural resource.

Please help us get to the bottom of this, once and for all. Then, let's figure out how to fix the problem. There is nothing more precious than fresh water, and I fear we are leaving a terrible legacy to our children and grandchildren if we do not address this water quality issue in Lake Erie. Furthermore, the economic impact on the State of Ohio, by not addressing this water quality issue, could be devastating to our fishing and tourism industry. It is already happening.

More than 100 North Collinwood business owners, artists and residents came together in September to remind the neighborhood that E. 185th Street is alive and well.

On Saturday, September 12 the neighborhood celebrated "Alive on E. 185." This year the neighborhood festival was a smaller iteration of the annual gathering, but with more art than ever before.

Neighborhood merchants set up information booths, children's activities, events and live music along the sidewalks between Hiller Avenue and Cornwall Road. Alive on E. 185 featured numerous pop-up events this year, including fashion shows, martial arts demonstrations, live music, children's art activities and blood pressure screen-

The street also came to life with vibrant, temporary art installations and interactive programs. Neighborhood residents Diane Collins and Abby Baumgartner created brilliantly colored trees, giant spools of

"thread" (using old industrial rope, spools and a touch of paint), window murals, craft flowers and eye-catching displays in the planters lining the street. Perris Mackey, another area resident, led children in a DIY sticker making activity, while Sandra and John McKinney at McKinney Printing led sessions on making t-shirt art.

Live music included WindWood outside The Coffeehouse on 185th and Joe Rolling Porter, Tracy Marie and Bill Hatch outside Omeleggedon. Hooper Farms was on-site providing healthy, delicious food using local produce. Omeleggedon - a new restaurant set to open in the former Old World Meats building - had samples of their double chocolate bacon and Thanksgiving

corn muffins. Merchants donated dozens of items for two gift baskets showcasing the unique shopping along the street; the baskets were both offered as prizes for a raffle to support future events.

Collinwood Builds "Little Free Libraries"!

"Be awesome! Be a book nut!" Dr. Seuss And we definitely need more of us here in Collinwood! So, on August 31, a group of us from Collinwood joined the Little Free Library Big Little Build at Cleveland Public Library's Eastman Reading Garden (which has actually been around, as the Reading Garden, since 1960.) And the Little Red Cap Project members werethere - for a very cool reason, as you'll see! Here in Collinwood, it was Caroline Peak, who is District 5 Manager for the Cleveland Public Library, who brought this opportunity to us, through her involvement in the Little Free Library Cleveland Movement, in collaboration with Cleveland Public Library Literature Department and Ohio Center for the Book Manager, Amy Dawson. The Ohio Center for the Book has been supporting Little Free Libraries since 2012 and has helped to give away over 5000 books to Cleveland residents.

What, you may be asking, is the Little Free Library (LFL) movement?

The Little Free Library movement is about something very simple: getting people to read. And the magic that comes with that is people meeting people.

Not only do books move through the neighborhood, but time and again, people

connect at the LFL (I imagine the conversation starter is something like: "what're you reading there?") People meet people visiting the LFLs, and we become neighbors again. (A happy side effect, I think, no?) Reading is not only the key to success for children - and adults as well - but these LFLs bring neighbors together, and even help connect us all to art. (Decorating these is limited only by your imagination! Likewise, what kind of "container" you put them in! Check out Mental Floss at http://mentalfloss.com/article/61083/15gorgeous-little-free-libraries - and see if it gives you any ideas!)

So how does it work? LFL movement says Take a Book; Return a Book - or Both - so it can't be simpler: you take a book, and you leave a book. That's it. The book is yours, no due date, you read it - and if you want to bring it back, you can. If not, bring another! (And if you've got extra books - we're all glad to have them for these LFLs!)

Intrigued? Check out the current LFLs at Collinwood Neighborhood Catholic Ministries, the Salvation Army, Collinwood Village Academy, and the Lakefront Literacy bus, which is at Euclid Beach some Saturdays. Memorial School's will be up soon, & we're planning for another at O H Perry School - so stay tuned!

Back to the Eastman Garden ... We were two of four teams that came to Eastman to build four Little Free Library (LFL) units. After introductions to the projects that day (and a brief introduction of Little Red Cap by co-chairs Charlotte Iafeliece and your reporter) the fun began. (Collinwood neighbors building included Margaret Craig, Caroline Peak, Charlotte Iafeliece, Memorial Principal Michelle Person, Mary Louise Daley, Julia DiBaggio, Councilman Polensek, & me.)

Basically each team had a LFL "kit", with the instructions and tools needed to assemble one basic LFL. The kits were donated to the Ohio Center for the Book by LFL founder, Todd Bol who is sponsoring an "Across America with the Little Free Library" multi-year road trip plan to support literacy and a love of reading with LFLs.

The fun - & hilarity - began when our group actually started to build the LFLs from scratch. The pictures give an idea of all the fun! (Suffice it to say, while these things are reasonably simple in design, putting tools in the hands of those us not as familiar with said tools, can make for much mayhem. Which, thanks to Councilman Polensek for helping us, was kept to a minimum. All four got built tho, and they all looked fun!)

Another Mother's Milk - Milk Money - self-

Quick note: I've been told they're working on getting a download together as well, but right now it's just on CD. Onto the content. "Milk Money" is a good solid 50 minutes of trashy garage pop/rock. A couple songs, such as "Kirtland" and "My Own Scum," go into a folk kinda territory as well. And whatever you'd like to count "Robot Noises" as, kind of a, well, robotic stomp. Domestic Violence Group Coming This Spring

Coming soon to Collinwood this spring and sponsored by Center for Advanced Mental Health Practice Foundation will be a sixteen week group on the subject of Domestic Violence. Dates, times, and location to be determined. "You ask yourself: 'Is it bad enough for me to call it domestic violence? Is it bad enough for me to call it abuse? Is it bad enough for me to call the police? Is it bad enough for me to leave?""

If you know of someone who is in this predicament you can reach out and help them by sharing this information with them or other concerned individuals. Here are a few of the many statistics regarding domestic violence provided by the National Coalition against Domestic Violence listed on their website www.dvcac.org or www. odvn.org. Every 9 seconds in the US, a woman is assaulted or beaten. On average, nearly 20 people per minute are physically abused by an intimate partner in the United States. During one year, this equates to



more than 10 million women and men. 1 in 3 women and 1 in 4 men have been victims of [some form of] physical violence by an intimate partner within their lifetime.

On a typical day, there are more than 20,000 phone calls placed to domestic violence hotlines nationwide. Intimate partner violence accounts for 15% of all violent crime. Women between the ages of 18-24 are most commonly abused by an intimate partner.

We are all busy. So busy. Too busy. What is something else most of us have in common? We commute to work, to shop, to play, to dinner. For those of us who use public transportation waiting for the bus is the least productive and most annoying part of the commute (well, aside from potholes).

Coming soon to a bus shelter near you is an art project that challenges our community to join together in exercise and make great use of that idle time waiting for the bus!

Thanks to a grant funded in part by Cuyahoga Arts and Culture and awarded by jury selection through Northeast Shores Community Development Corporations' "COLLINWOOD 2015" health initiative, this Fall three bus shelters in the North Shore Collinwood neighborhood will be transformed by a printed, clear vinyl wrap illustrating simple, easy exercises along with preventive care facts and tips on health habits.

Were you one of the more than 39.5 nillion RTA bus riders in 2014? Do you wish you had more time to exercise and improve your health? Unless you have the bus schedule memorized (and even then) you DO have time, while waiting. Whether five minutes or fifteen, when riders engage in physical activity while waiting for the bus, the incidence of diabetes, high blood pressure and other health risks related to sedentary lifestyles may be reduced.

It is difficult to dedicate time to a daily exercise routine and even more difficult to know where and how to start. This project will transform idle time waiting for a bus into workout time with a little bit of instruction and inspiration. And don't worry, there won't be too much perspiration as these activities are designed for a person of average mobility in "street" clothes. Such exercises include calf-raises, marching in place with high-knees, and yoga-influenced stretches to warm up the muscles, release tension and peak your heart rate

Hands-On Learning Focus: **Clean Water**

As part of Cleveland's Year of Clean Water, Our Lady of the Lake School got a grant to study local water. OLL has STEM programs at all grade levels, and this cool project is a great example. Second graders in Ms Zbiegen's class and Mrs. Ezzo's class will be doing a whole unit on water filtration and water quality, as a fun way to study the scientific method as it applies to their daily lives. They've learned all about what children in other countries have to do to get clean water. Now they're learning about our own water supply right here. They are visiting Lake Erie, and going online to chart bacteria levels. They're visiting the Waste Water Treatment plant,

There's an exciting new wave of CMSD leadership in the Collinwood area schools.

Four of the five CMSD schools in the K-8 buildings in the neighborhood have new principals at the helm and the remaining school has a second-year leader.

The new principals are Jennifer Woody at Euclid Park, Katherine Coverdale at Hannah Gibbons, Michelle Person at Memorial and Anne Priemer at O.H. Perry. At Iowa-Maple School, Natalie Benson is in her second year heading the school.

Brianna Savoca Koehler, director of Talent Acquisition for the District, said "recruiting great talent to lead schools" has been an important piece of "identifying the best fit for our scholars and the com-

"In Collinwood, we've hired five rock star principals who outshined other applicants, and each solo principal was the best match to lead each respective building," she said. "Through professional development opportunities and continued recruitment of strong teachers, we will give these new principals the tools and talent needed to lead high performing schools."

Here's a glimpse at the new leaders:

Jennifer Woody, Euclid Park PreK-8 School Jennifer Woody comes to CMSD with a diverse background in finance and nonprofit grant writing. She cited the existing "outstanding instructional staff" at Euclid Park and said the school is continually developing a "focus that includes engaging every scholar every day via an inquiry base

"All scholars that attend Euclid Park will depart with 21st century skills in technology, public speaking and college readiness,"

The school also has incorporated extracurricular activities such as Lady Bound, boys and girl's basketball, chess, Boy Scouts, and the N.OW Bullying Program to develop character and sportsmanship, she

Woody graduated from Ohio University with an education degree, but only after first switching from an international finance major, and later received her Master's Degree from Cleveland State Uni-

versity and has taught students across the PreK-12 spectrum.

She also served as academic coordinator for the Upward Bound Program at Case Western Reserve University, which she said "reinforced my grant writing skills and fueled my energy to increase the number of low-income first generation college students matriculating to college. "

Katherine Coverdale, Hannah Gibbons PreK-8 STEM School

At Hannah Gibbons, new Principal Katherine E. Coverdale is a lifelong educator who grew up in the Cleveland area and received her principal's license from Cleveland State University.

Coverdale said she comes back to Cleveland "after exploring the mountains for 10 years and has returned home with the specific goal of leading a CMSD school to academic success."

She is a graduate of Colorado College with a degree in sociology and a Master's Degree in teaching. She had previously taught in grades 4-6 and worked in support positions in all PreK-8 grades.

"Hannah Gibbons-STEM School is an exciting school where science, technology, engineering and math come alive in the form of Capstone projects," she said. "I am excited to lead the scholars of Hannah Gibbons towards successful STEM careers

Michelle Person, Memorial PreK-8 School At Memorial PreK-8 School, things were busy on Friday, Aug. 15: Teachers were setting up classrooms, parents were stopping buy to iron out last minute registration details, and everyone was excited to do a little line dancing, enjoy an ice cream sundae, and meet the school's new principal, Michelle Person.

Person, a former CMSD teacher with over a decade of classroom experience, said the reception was fantastic.

"The community support has been amazing," she said. "Everyone has been extremely welcoming, from the parents, to the staff. It's going to be a great year. "

Her career began in 2000 as a Teach For America corps member originally assigned to Newark, NJ. A native of Cleveland, Person taught for four years in New Jersey before returning home.



Iowa-Maple PreK-8 School

Upon her return to Cleveland, Michelle worked at Citizens' Academy and Warner Girls Leadership Academy before moving into the role of principal at a West Side charter school, where she helped lead the school to a 20-point Performance Index increase.

Now, as a "true believer in the ability of education to transform lives," Person said she is eager and excited about leading the way at Memorial.

"There is work to be done and my staff and I are prepared to do what it takes to get it done", Person said.

The school's preschool program recently received five stars, the highest designation available, from the state of Ohio's Step Up to Quality program, Person said.

Memorial also has a state-of-the-art computer lab, media center, and SMART Boards in every classroom, she said.

The school is also planning to dedicate a new Little Free that will pay tribute to the victims of the Collinwood school fire of 1908. The school was named Memorial as a remembrance.

Anne Priemer, Oliver H. Perry PreK-8 Schoo

Anne Priemer, the new principal at Oliver H. Perry, began her career in education as a special education teacher in Harlem, New York. Three years ago she moved back to her hometown of Cleveland and spent several years at Citizens Leadership Academy, a Breakthrough Charter School in the Hough neighborhood of Cleveland.

Then, in the 2014-15 school year, she was part of CMSD's Aspiring Principals Program, a joint initiative of the CMSD and the New York City Leadership Academy.

Citing the Cleveland Plan for Transforming Schools, which states that "our schools must run [...] beyond printed textbooks and beyond the physical walls of today's classrooms," Ann Priemer said her "overarching goal is to provide O.H. Perry scholars not with an education of worksheets, textbooks and lectures, but with experiences that develop their whole person."

She said she wants the O.H. Perry students to "have experiences that will develop their intellect: their ability to see multiple solutions to a problem, and their ability to use evidence to support their own conclu-

sions."

"I want all of our scholars to graduate knowing the value of other perspectives and possessing a strong sense of empathy, compassion and integrity," she said.

Priemer said she welcomes community volunteers at the school who would "like to play with our scholars at recess, read a book to our PreK-3 grade scholars, or bring an after-school program to our school."

Natalie Smith-Benson, Iowa-Maple PreK-8 School

Smith-Benson is the Collinwood area veteran in more ways than one: Not only is she in her second year at the school, but she's lived in the area for the last 16 years.

And she's a CMSD veteran: "I've been a substitute teacher, kindergarten teacher, assistant principal, curriculum instructional specialist and now a principal," she said

Smith-Benson received her education degree from Central State University and has two Masters Degrees from Cleveland State University, one in speech communications and the other in curriculum and instruction for early childhood, with an Education Specialist Degree in Administration

"We have a lot of great things going on at Iowa Maple," she said. "For example our middle school scholars are learning abou the scientific method and are actively engaged conducting science experiments on a daily basis."

She said teachers in grades 6-8 are also being trained for "Fuel Education Blended Learning," a program already being used in CMSD high schools for credit recovery. She said Iowa-Maple is a pilot school to see how the program works in elementary schools

Smith-Benson cited a successful early September school rally in which students performed raps, poems and chants about the importance of school attendance ("Get to School. You Can Make It!), anti-bullying and others, including rhymes about college mascots to get the students thinking about post-secondary education as early as possible
