Three years ago, the pedestrian bridge over Interstate 90 connecting two east side Cleveland neighborhoods was struck and so severely damaged that it had to be removed. This week crews on behalf of the Ohio Department of Transportation (ODOT) have started a project to replace the pedestrian bridge.

"We understand the importance of this connection for the adjacent neighborhoods," said District 12 Deputy Director Myron Pakush. "ODOT has been working with city officials since 2013 to develop and implement a plan to replace the structure." The bridge will once again link the northern and southern portions of the historic Nottingham Village and North Shore Collinwood neighborhoods at the eastern edge of Cleveland. "The bridge was designed not

just to enhance transportation but also intended to be a piece of public art designed differently to complement the neighborhood," said Ward 8 Councilman Michael Polensek. "In fact, the new proposed bike path linking the lakefront to the Highland Road entrance to the Euclid Creek Reservation will traverse the new pedestrian bridge."

Preliminary construction operations over the next few weeks will not have any impacts to traffic on I-90. Beginning in approximately mid-May, daytime lane closures on I-90 - west of East 185th Street - will take place Monday through Friday during off-peak travel times. Occasional overnight lane closures will be necessary when crews begin setting overhead beams. Motorists can stay up-to-date about lane closures on I-90 by visiting www.Ohgo.com.

Councilman's Corner

Good weather is finally here; at least I think so. With the good weather brings construction work which is

about to begin on several key projects all of which will have an impact on our community.

Demolition has begun on the concrete turrets of the destroyed pedestrian bridge over I-90 which was hit about three years ago by a truck. Construction of a new pedestrian bridge by ODOT will continue through the summer and is scheduled to be completed by the end of the year.

Final work will begin shortly on the new Veteran's Park at East 174th Street and Lakeshore Boulevard. The dedication of the park is set for Sunday, June 12, 2016 at 2:00 PM. The groundbreaking for the new Eastside Market at East 105th Street and St Clair is set for Thursday, May 5th at 6:00 PM. We are hoping this will be the impetus for additional enhancement and investment along the St Clair Corridor. Design work continues on the proposed new Oliver Hazard Perry School. Public meetings and updates will be forthcoming. As of this writing, we have heard nothing

more about Cleveland Clinic's long-range plans for Euclid Hospital in light of the fact that they are moving in-patient beds and employees from Euclid to a new planned Beachwood facility. I have asked our Congresswoman, Marcia Fudge, to become engaged in this matter. She has toured the hospital approximately two weeks ago with Clinic officials to better understand what is being proposed. We are all waiting for a planned meeting with Clinic officials to be scheduled some time soon. As I have said before, Euclid Hospital's presence is critical to the well-being of the residents and the communities of both Euclid and the Greater Collinwood and Glenville neighborhoods of the City of Cleveland. Let's

hope that Clinic officials understand how passionately we feel about Euclid Hospital and its role in our community.

Everyone is aware of the ongoing problems and issues with abandoned, condemned and foreclosed homes in our greater community. Recently, through the Federal "Hardest Hit" Fund, Ohio was in line to receive a substantial amount of revenue to address these properties. In our own area it would have directed funds to the Cuyahoga County LandBank to either demolish or repair the home once the property was obtained. Unfortunately, the State of Ohio failed to file all the appropriate documents and so the funding we thought we would be receiving will be substantially less. Only time will tell as to how much of the funds Cuyahoga County will be receiving in order to rid our communities of these eyesores and safety hazards. Watch for future updates on this critical issue.

With good weather we all see the debris left from the winter whether it is in our own yards or on our streets. Join in our community clean up on Saturday, May 7 either by joining the official neighborhood activities or by cleaning up in your own yard and street. Community pride should not be just one day, though. If we all do our part, our community can continue to be a great place to live, work and play. That old saying, "charity starts at home," the same holds true for cleaning up your property; it starts with one property and will spread outward throughout the neighborhood.

I look forward to seeing everyone at our numerous community meetings and events. Watch for the "Scoop on Summer" guide to help you plan your summer in the neighborhood. Remember, too, the Friday Night Summer Concert series at Euclid Beach Park and all the other concerts and activities that take place in the community through the summer months. Hope to see

The Cuyahoga County Medical Examiner's Office reported twelve fatal overdoses in four days in mid-March. A week later, they reported eight more fatalities within three days. Police in Elyria said they responded to

six overdoses in 24 hours in late April. So far the city of Elyria has seen twelve deaths due to the heroin epidemic. Lake County has reported ten fatal overdoses so far this year, but that number is

Playwrights Local 4181 Premieres "To the Orchard" at Waterloo Arts

Playwrights Local 4181 announces the world premiere of Cleveland-based writer Les Hunter's To the Orchard. Directed by Dale Heinen, the play runs May 27 through June 5 at Waterloo Arts in North Collinwood and June 10 through 12 at Dobama Theatre in Cleveland Heights. This is the first full production for Playwrights Local, a 501(c)(3) company whose recent presentations include the 2015 Cleveland Playwrights Festival.

In To the Orchard, college student Rachel Bergman reveals her sexual identity to her Orthodox Jewish father, who also is struggling with his own hidden past. In coming to terms with each other--and themselves--the pair must reconcile the conflicting pulls of tradition and individual desire. The play takes place in Brooklyn in the recent past, but incorporates dreamlike visits to turn-of-the-century England and the lost Jewish Eastern Europe. The spirits of Robert Plant and Virginia Woolf add a touch of

magic realism to this intimate work about making mistakes, coming clean, and the power of history and family.

"To the Orchard examines contemporary issues, but within the context of timeless concerns," said David Todd, Artistic Director of Playwrights Local. "It also balances a compelling narrative with moments of heightened theatricality. It sends a strong message for our company, which is that we're interested in exposing Cleveland audiences to a very up-to-date style of playwriting as practiced locally."

Prior to this world premiere, To the Orchard received a National Foundation for Jewish Culture New Play grant, and was developed at Boston Playwrights Theatre and Brooklyn College. In January, the play was named a finalist for the Jewish Plays Project's 2016 contest. "This production also has garnered support from the Arch and Bruce Brown Foundation," notes Todd. "This is a good indication of the quality and relevance of Les' work."



During the last five years, the company has acquired two additional snow-related companies: Safety Source, run by General Manager Pat Gavin, and Elkin, run by General Manager Eric Fox. The company continues to grow in both locations fueled in part by a strategy of purchasing raw materials, including carbide (second only in hardness to diamonds), and manufacturing its flagship products entirely in the U.S. All of its competitors import their carbide from China. Ironhawk has been able to secure a valuable partnership with Kennametal for domestic carbide and offer its products at a lower cost than the imported competition.

Its customers also have access to the industry's best technical expertise. Ron Abramczyk, a five-year Ironhawk employee, came from a local competitor and has 20 years of industry experience. Mike Sparks joined Ironhawk after 30 plus years with Bucyrus Blades located in Central Ohio. Elizabeth Dellinger comes from a major Cleveland law firm background as a partner and also serves as chief operating officer. Schools to Join Mentoring Program

A mentoring program for Cleveland Metropolitan School District eighth-graders will double its reach to 46 schools this fall.

True2U, a collaborative effort involving the Cleveland Foundation, the District, the Greater Cleveland Partnership and the Neighborhood Leadership Institute, guides the students as they prepare for what can be a make-or-break transition to high school, post-secondary education or training and careers.

Collinwood-area chools that will be add ed include Memorial, Hannah Gibbons, Euclid Park, Iowa-Maple and Kenneth W. Clement Boys' Leadership Academy. Oliver H. Perry and East Clark already participate. After the expansion, the program will be in more than half of CMSD's K-8 schools. The remaining schools will be added during the 2017-18 academic year.

Each month, mentors from corporations and other segments of the community fan out for three hours to participating schools, helping students to envision their future and work on skills required to make that future a reality.

Much of the focus is on career and college readiness, said Shana Marbury, general counsel and vice president for the Greater Cleveland Partnership, a metropolitan area chamber of commerce.

"For GCP, that's one of the biggest attractions of the program," Marbury said as she and other mentors worked with students last month at the Douglas MacArthur Girls' Leadership Academy on Valleyside Road. "It's building a pipeline." Mentors have undergone training led by Stedman Graham, a leadership consultant and author, and follow a curriculum based on his book, "Teens Can Make It Happen, Nine Steps to Success." They help the students assess and develop their decision-making skills, self-image, strengths and values.

At the beginning of the program, Brenda, a student at Douglas MacArthur, completed an assessment that showed she is introverted. The 13-year-old has resolved to challenge herself to be more outgoing

Mentors have helped the children research and choose their high schools. As a "portfolio district," CMSD permits students to select from an array of options to find the best fit.

Schools Plan to Serve Summer Meals

The Cleveland Metropolitan School District wants to help keep Cleveland children fed during the summer by serving them breakfast, lunch and possibly supper for free.

The summer program, to be held at up to 28 schools, would be free for residents 18 and younger, regardless of whether they are enrolled in the District. Adults who accompany the children can eat for a small price. Serving summer meals could be the first

step toward eventually making free and low-cost breakfast, lunch and supper available year-round at schools in one of the nation's poorest cities, said Joseph Vaughn, executive director of food and child nutri-

While the District serves the summer meals, the Greater Cleveland Food Bank would handle administrative duties for the program. The two already work together on food pantries at five schools, with a grant from the Morgan Stanley financial services

"The Greater Cleveland Food Bank is happy to partner with the Cleveland Metropolitan School District this summer," said Kristin Warzocha, president and chief executive officer of the food bank. "No one ever wants to see a child to go hungry. This is a great opportunity to support CMSD in their efforts to make sure that their students have nutritious meals throughout the sum-

CMSD is finalizing the list of summer meal sites, most of which would offer breakfast and lunch. Hours will vary by location.

Some sites would limit meals to students who are attending summer school in the same buildings. Four high schools are hosting summer school but would still welcome

Vaughn estimates the schools would serve 250,000 meals during the summer. The U.S. Department of Agriculture would reimburse the District for the cost of the meals, but Vaughn said: "This isn't about making money. It's about feeding children."

Vaughn joined CMSD last year after overseeing food service for the Huntsville, Ala., schools. He started a similar program there and said it proved popular.

The changes are the latest in a series for the food-service program.

Vaughn previously replaced prepackaged meals with dishes made from scratch and served cafeteria-style. He also added fat-free strawberry and chocolate milk to go with vanilla on the menu.

Through March, District cafeterias had served 2,300 more meals per day than during the same period a year earlier. For the year, milk consumption was up by 785,000

Collinwood is Supplier for Space Program

Some Collinwood High School 10th-graders are supplying gear for crew of the International Space Station.

Students in teacher Rosalyn Allen's Fashion and Design make components for totes officially known as cargo transfer bags – that astronauts can use to carry science experiments, food, clothing and other items.

It's part of the High School Students United with NASA to Create Hardware, or HUNCH, program that the space agency started 13 years ago.

Some schools actually make hardware, like the storage locker parts machined at the Medina County Career Center, one of three other participating Ohio sites. But Collinwood is a soft- goods supplier.

For now, the Collinwood-made components will become part of bags used in training. If the students stick with Fashion Design II and become more skilled with their product, the totes will end up aboard the space station.

"This is an ongoing project," said Allen, whose students began working part time on the bags a little less than two months ago. "We don't anticipate a stopping point."

The students cut strips for fasteners and plastic for pockets that they stitch onto the bag's nylon sides. They also attach D-shaped metal rings and sew in lining.

The 22 students feel a sense of purpose as they go about their work.

"We are only in the 10th grade, and we are making something that could go into outer space," said Chardajah Martin, an aspiring pediatrician who took the class for fun.

Bashonne Hemingway, a point guard on Collinwood's basketball team, yearns to play professionally or at least stay close to sports as a physical therapist. In the meantime, he takes pride in sewing for the space program.

"It counts as an accomplishment," he said. "I made a bag for someone who's doing something a lot of people don't get a chance

Collinwood is one of CMSD's four New Tech Academies, part of a national projectbased network that engages students with hands-on work. CMSD is a "portfolio district," offering students a variety of school options so they can choose the one that best fits their needs.

The tote project blends math, social studies and history. Students measure and cut material, but they also learn about a space station program that dates back 16 years and 46 expeditions and brings nations together in international cooperation.

NASA's Cleveland-based Glenn Research Center began participating in HUNCH two years ago and recruited Collinwood to the

Glenn provided Collinwood with two industrial sewing machines and material and trained students to make components that meet the agency's standards.

The students learn about quality control, said Nancy Hall, an aerospace engineer and manager of the HUNCH project at Glenn. They also gain what could be an edge in the

"This is great to put on a resume," Hall said. "This is something that benefits the space program and the astronauts."







We visited the Iwo Jima memorial, the Korean War memorial and the World War II memorial. Fundations Transforms Reading

As educators we are always seeking the best tools to help our students succeed in the classroom in each subject area. Phonics is such a key component to reading that we decided to explore how to enhance instruction here at Our Lady of the Lake School. With the support of Mrs. Kingsbury, and after doing some online research and speaking with reading specialists, we decided to focus on the Wilson Reading Fundations phonics program. This program is truly all encompassing. Fundations provides a systematic and explicit approach to reading and spelling with phonics.

In Fundations, students use all types of manipulatives along with fine and gross motor skills. Each day the class does a sound drill to focus on new sounds and review sounds previously taught. There are many picture cards (which the students love) and posters to aid in this process. Sound boards are used to help students spell words and allow teachers to observe exactly how a student is hearing a word. Fundations focuses on using fingers to tap the sounds of decodable words to assist students in hearing sounds. Students move quickly from spelling simple one-syllable words to multisyllabic words, which quickly increases their vocabulary. Expanding

vocabulary is another huge component of the program.

Fundations has completely changed my approach to teaching reading. As a reading teacher I would often say "Use your finger to help you follow along and point to the words." This program has taught me that we need to teach students to read in phrases as opposed to word-by-word. Teaching the "scooping" method always helps students to build fluency skills. If you notice there is very little use of

technology. After taking the class I learned this was done on purpose. The Wilson creators want the students doing everything by using fine or gross motor skills. They argue that students are relying too much on just opening a device and typing answers. This program really believes in muscle memory and how it helps the brain to remember faster and more easily.

We will be bringing the Wilson Reading Fundations phonics program to our entire Kindergarten through 2nd grade next year. Our teachers will all be attending training sessions over the summer. We know that implementation of this program will greatly benefit our students. We look forward to our coming 2016-2017 school year with enthusiasm and much excitement!

Then, Junior Achievement was exciting. The scholars learned how to build their own businesses. Mr. Durbin expressed and taught them how to save money. This was an amazing class because students never realized what it takes to maintain a home, to work daily, and to care for your family from

an income, that all bills have to be out of.

Lastly, the 6th-8th graders attended the S.T.E.M. Program at United Skates of America. These scholars had a review of Newton's Law of Motion. The 1st Law of Motion, is an object at rest will remain at rest, and a moving object will remain at a constant velocity unless unbalanced forces act on it, "law of inertia." The 2nd Law of Motion, is the greater the mass of an object being accelerated, the greater the amount of force needed to accelerate the object. The 3rd Law of Motion, for every action there is an equal and opposite reaction. Forces always in pairs. The students found out that in skating, we use all three Laws of Motion!

The 6th grade scholars have become buddies with our Pre-Schoolers. Every month we work on a project wih them for social skills. It has been a wonderful experience working with these young scholars!

Slovenian Workmen's Home – 90 Years Of Reality – 100 Years Of Memories

In a building known as Stakich Hall on November 10, 1916, a group of Slovenians representing many organizations met to discuss building a "Home" to accommodate the promotion of their social, fraternal, cultural, athletic and civic activitie.

In August of 1917 the name Slovenian Workmen's Home (SWH) was approved and the first Board of Directors was elected.

In 1919 the land was acquired and in order to raise funds for the erection of the building, shares were sold to various groups and to individuals. Of the 4,700 certificates issued, over 50% were purchased by organizations

In 1920, before the first shovel of dirt was dug, the following additional organizations were formed:

Waterloo Club (later known as the United Cultural Society), Anton Verovsek Dramatic Club and the Ladies Auxiliary, who to this day have held a Friday Fish Fry to raise money for SWH.

Many individuals and groups spent countless hours promoting affairs and various fund raising events to accumulate the much needed capital for their project. With the offer of a bank loan, ground was finally broken.

In 1926 the building was completed. Gala festivities inaugurated the formal opening and dedication, which took place January 1 and 2 of 1927. The original building consisted of a recreation hall, auditorium, business offices, meeting rooms and a library. A Slovenian school was organized in 1931. Classes began on January 20, 1932. That same year saw the beginning of SO-KOLS, a gymnastic group. The Slovenian junior chorus Mladenski Penske Zbor was formed in 1934.

In 1935 the street bar section of the building was completed and four years later saw the opening of eight bowling alleys, four indoor balina courts and a party



room. These additions helped with added income. During this same year, the lower bar was built and land for the parking lot was purchased.

Many of the boys in the community served in the armed forces and the "Home" became a center for the Red Cross, war bond drives and many other World War II time activities. The Progressive Slovenian Women of America (PSWA) organization felt the patriotic urge and collected funds for the memorial monument to commemorate the many boys who were in the service and many who lost their lives. In 1945 the memorial garden with its monument was dedicated and turned over to SWH and a tradition was born and was upheld for many years. SWH was most grateful to the Euclid Veterans Club who remembered their war buddies and paid tribute to their memory every year with traditional Memorial Day Services in the garden. This year also saw the charter of the corporation changed to a non-profit status and all shares were exchanged for membership

In 1948 additional office space and an apartment were added which completed the building program.

In the political arena, the 32nd Ward Democratic Club met at SWH for many years and then the 32nd Ward Republican Club made SWH their headquarters. A newcomer was the Waterloo Beach Association, which awakened the community with its pride of ownership and its neighborly attitude towards all newcomers.

Since most of the pioneers of the SWH were in the working class, they became staunch supporters of unions and the working man. SWH was available in the event of strike to all 23 local unions, which met on the premises. Currently only two unions continue to meet at SWH.

The SWH came to the fore in all matters of the community, civic, national and international events. In the aftermath of World War II, many drives inaugurated by the government were amply supported by the various groups. The pride of the first generation Slovenes in their wonderful adopted country was shown in the immediate efforts to help others less fortunate.

Things were relatively quiet until the 1970's. The purchase of the adjacent property took place in 1973, which involved tearing down a house to provide additional parking. Tarr Drug moved from SWH in 1974. That space was remodeled into the current upper hall bar.

The Ladies Auxiliary was re-organized in 1980. Through their untiring efforts and determination, the lower hall kitchen was remodeled. They continued their remodeling project into the 1990's by completely redecorating the lower hall and the upper hall ballroom ("Waterloo Ballroom").

In 1993, the Board of Trustees approved the purchase of the property between the two parking lots. The loans from SNPJ and AMLA were paid off by 1998, again through the efforts of the Board and a generous donation from the Ladies Auxiliary. This purchase proved to be very profitable for SWH.

Major undertakings, which included numerous purchases, renovations and needed up-dating were accomplished throughout the property during the 2000's. A 90 year old building is in constant need of repair and up-dating. Some of the major projects have been the replacement of the boiler, a fire suppressive system in the kitchen, paving of the parking lots, new furnaces and many more. The income from the rental properties, the bar, the hall rentals, the Auxiliary, gratuities left at the bars and various fundraisers and generous donations were instrumental in generating the needed revenue to accomplish these projects. The Trustees and Auxiliary are the

wonderful job despite the scarcity of volunteers.

The upper hall ("Wateroo Ballroom") continues to be rented for weddings, dances and various events, as well as the lower hall, where the Friday Fish Fry is neld. The balina courts are n use most days October hrough April by the Waerloo Balina Club, fraternal groups and parties. The neeting rooms are rented by the Little League, various lodges, unions, theater groups, etc. The several uildings on the property also continue to be rented.

SWH was known as holding many Polka dances over the years. For the past several years, Sunday Polka Dances have again been held in the "Waterloo Ballroom" with many loyal dancers in attendance every Sunday.

Slovenian Workmen's Home belonged to the Federation of Slovenian National Homes, who held a banquet every year to honor a Federation Man/Woman of the year and individual hall Man/Woman of the year. The first banquet was held in 1962 at the Slovenian Workmen's Home with an admission charge of \$1.50 per person. The 1962 SWH Man of the Year was Walter Lampe.

Sincere congratulations to all of the past and present Trustees of SWH, the Auxiliary, who continues to this day to be an important group of volunteers, and to those who have supported the endeavors by attending the various functions and by their generous donations throughout the years.

The early pioneers would be pleased to know that their dreams of building a place where their people could gather in fellowship stood strong for 90 years.

With the approval of the SWH share-holders at a special meeting January 23, 2016, the board was given permission to sell the Slovenian Workmen's Home property and contents to Mr. Patrick Hawkins. SWH is considered an historical building and Mr. Hawkins promised the shareholders that he will keep the Slovenian heritage a priority.

Because of all of the many volunteer hours required for the building, the repairs, the fund raisers events, etc. to make the SWH a success, the motto has always been "Your Home Away from Home".

To celebrate this milestone, a dinner dance will be held Sunday, May 15, 2016 by advance reservations. For additional information, please call 216/481-5378.


