Forest City Volunteers Dedicate Time to Helping Hospice of the Western Reserve

For several years, employees from Forest City have generously donated many hours of their time and talent to complete a variety of volunteer projects at Hospice of the Western Reserve. The volunteer projects are part of the organization's annual Community Day and provide a way to give back to the local community.

This year, on May 18, a hardworking group of approximately 100 Forest City employees split up into two groups and arrived bright and early to get started. One

group painted the annex of a storage building at the Hospice of the Western Reserve's headquarters site while a second group of 67 mulched beds and landscaped the entire 22 acres on the grounds of David Simpson Hospice house and the adjacent lakefront property.

They planted a garden and installed donated perennials and a birdbath on the northwestern end of the property. Hospice of the Western Reserve installed a plaque in the garden honoring the Forest City volunteers and the many other volunteer groups

from the community who have contributed hundreds of hours of volunteer service through the years.

Since Holy Redeemer Church's founding in 1924, the honoring of St. Anthony has played an integral part in the life of the parish. The annual Tredicina, or 13 days of prayer begins Friday June 1st and concludes Wednesday June 13th coinciding with the of St. Anthony's death in Padua Italy in 1231.

For each Mass the church will host a different visiting clergy member who will expound on St. Anthony and the virtues and relevance of his message today. Patron Saint of the poor and oppressed, St. Anthony is also well-known as that of lost articles. Father Marty Polito, a Euclid native

and Pastor of Holy Redeemer since 1996, adds that it is not just for lost things but for people who may have lost either faith, hope, and/or love. That this is an occasion for prayer for things needed to be found in one's life and a time of self-renewal.

The feast celebration itself will start Saturday June 9th at 5:00 pm and is held in the school gymnasium and outside in the courtyard between the church till 8:00 pm. There will be concession stands featuring Italian food favorites, musical entertainment along with games of chance, various raffles and donated gift baskets.

Farewell to Fanny's

If you haven't been down East 152nd Street lately, you might not know that they've torn down Fanny's Restaurant. Shuttered for the last 11 years, it closed due to a huge back tax debt. It was this debt and the lien on the property that also complicated any purchase from potential buyers.

Fanny's was started by Frances "Fanny" Boldin and her daughter Frances "Fanny" Kollar in 1947 in a small storefront at 406 East 152nd Street, which would later become Fontina's Restaurant. Frances Boldin had prior ran the King Cole Restaurant on Lake Shore. In 1961 they moved to the southeast corner of East 152nd Street and Arcade Avenue into what was once an old farm house they would expand with an enclosed front porch and an L-shaped wrap-around addition. It would become a local landmark serving hearty comfort food fare to a cross-section of the city for three generations. It closed in April of 2007 after 60 years.

Councilman's Corner

You've all heard "I've got some good news and some bad news." The good news first. Summer is finally here and the construc-

going strong at Euclid Beach Park. Work will continue on this long-awaited project the remainder of the year, according to our partners, the Cleveland Metroparks. In addition, the Friday night concert series on the lake will resume once again starting June 1st at 6:00 p.m. and continue to run throughout the summer. Please join us for some incredible music on the lake right here in our own community. More good news. The Cleveland Clinic purchased the former Sodexo Laundry facility at 15300 S. Waterloo Road at East 152nd Street. They have partnered with Evergreen Cooperative to operate the complex which will supply laundry and linen for all Cleveland Clinic hospitals and medical offices. Evergreen and the Clinic have been working with my office and plan to invest substantially in new equipment and ramping up employment and job opportunities. This is exciting news for our community, especially for the historic Collinwood Yard Industrial Park.

Now, the bad news. Early evening on Saturday, May 19, 2018 at around 4:00 p.m., the Northshore Collinwood area and beyond, was hit with a massive rainstorm. In less than 45 minutes, approximately 2.0 plus inches of rain fell. Countless homes, businesses and institutions experienced severe basement flooding. Some of which had never been flooded before. The area of flooding ran from East 200th Street to the lake, and as far west as East 140th Street. The affected area was massive and damage was inflicted on far too many properties.

To add to this misery was the fact that over the last several years, millions of dollars have been spent on storm water-related sewer projects and retention facilities. This included new and rebuilt storm sewers on many streets in the neighborhood. It goes without saying that all of us who were affected by flooded basements know the rainfall was unreal. That's a fact! However, the real question we are all asking is why was the flooding so widespread and severe? What I witnessed first-hand being out that evening was the following: during the rainstorm, Euclid Creek rose to flood

stage, thereby preventing storm water to exit through the outfalls along the creek. In addition, the pump house at Lakeshore Boulevard at the creek, was at capacity! Furthermore, the major outfall at East Park and Dorchester Drives, at the lake, was clogged with storm debris thereby causing a major backup to the entire sewer system west of Lakeshore Boulevard and the Neff Road outfall at the lake was flowing but restricted once again, by storm debris. The most critical component during this whole episode was the fact that the new Lakeshore Boulevard Storm Sewer that was constructed by the Northeast Regional Sewer District (NEORSD), along with the Euclid Creek Tunnel Storm Retention facility, which was completed well over one year ago, were not

operational. So, when you combine all of

these factors with the amount of rainfall, it

created the perfect storm for disaster. NEORSD stated in The Plain Dealer on Wednesday, May 23, 2018, "that they could not activate the sewers due to a major problem they have experienced with the new pump house in Bratenahl Village along I-90 because of severe vibrations coming from the pumps themselves when activated." They believe the problems will be rectified by late July of this year. It is very clear to me that until these major sewers come online, we will continue to run the risk of major basement flooding. I would advise all affected property owners to be very mindful of this fact. For all of our basements are at continued risk until these critical projects are activated and completed.

So what else can be done to help address this problem besides ongoing intense maintenance of the outfalls and system itself? The City of Cleveland's Water Pollution Control (WPC), the Department of Public Utilities, and my office, have been meeting trying to come up with an action plan. As a result, on Monday, May 14, 2018, City Council passed Ordinance No. 422-18, earmarking approximately \$8.8 million to install a new storm sewer along East 185th Street from Pawnee Avenue, south to Marcella Road, then north to Lakeshore Boulevard. This project, which I sponsored, is designed to move storm water out of the neighborhood at a much quicker pace along the entire East 185th Street corridor and beyond. This project should commence in late 2019 and will be tunnel-bored vs. open trench, thereby permitting traffic to move more freely during the construction phase and having less of an impact on the surrounding residential neighborhood.

At the end of the day, millions of dollars are being spent to address basement flooding in the Ward and water quality issues along our lakefront. I am committed to doing everything I can to tackle this horrific problem which has affected so many families and businesses alike. We cannot rebuild our neighborhood and move forward with severe and ongoing basement flooding. We collectively have to come up with a plan that makes sense and addresses the problem.

I don't have to tell anyone that the grass is growing. If there is a property on your street, whether occupied or unoccupied, where the grass is uncut and taller than eight (8) inches, please call the Mayor's Action Center at 664-2900 to report the ad-

#Collinwoodreads-Something is **New In Collinwood**



A group of community members are working together to support a literacy initiative— Little Free Library Neighborhood(LFL)-that began in Slavic Village with support for WKYC's, Margaret Bernstein, Director of Advocacy and Community Initiatives. Because of its success, it is now expanding to three additional neighborhoods, Hough, Central and Collinwood. The focus is to show the importance of reading at community events, the library and neighborhood schools and other institutions in the neighborhood. In addition, the community focuses on being a Little Free Library Neighborhood, where Little Free Library (places where people can pick up free books to read). Fourth-generation metalworking shop works to generate student interest in manufacturing careers

by Gina M. Tabasso In 1904, George Hewlett founded Cleveland Union Engineering Company in Cleveland's Flats area. The company handled industrial metal manufacturing, welding, fabrication and steel erection. Hewlett's daughter married John Geiger, who is the grandfather of the current owner, also John Geiger, and great-grandfather of Jake who also works for the company. In the 1920s, it began to develop and build equipment for the distillery and brewing industries to clean and pasturize milk jugs and beer bottles, hence a name change to Beverage Engineering. In the 1940s, it moved to its current location on Lakewood Heights Boulevard and transitioned its focus from beverage machines to machining for the war effort, and in 1957 it found its current

incarnation as Beverage Machine & Fabricators, Inc. What do these changes signify? Adaptability! And, Beverage Machine has

Though the company no longer is part of the beverage machine industry, it has continued its journey in the metalworking industry and now machines (cuts or finishes) hard-to-machine metal parts made from inconel, monel, stainless steel and titanium. It also has larger machines that can handle bigger, heavier pieces (up to 10 feet in diameter and 24,000 pounds) for the steel, energy, power, mining, nuclear, aerospace and defense industries. For example, it did a project for SpaceX last year, a company that designs, manufactures and launches advanced rockets and spacecraft. Beverage Machine also only handles oneoff pieces and smaller orders rather than high-volume production. Its orders range from one to 25 pieces at a time. Five years ago, it added waterjet cutting to its capability, which broke the company out of traditional metal machining. Using the waterjet, the company has done work for sign and glass companies and machined the glass awards for last year's Tri-C JazzFest. With one piece of equipment, it expanded capacity and its customer base.

All of Beverage Machine's customers are regional, and they are served by only 16 employees. The company mainly employees machinists and is looking to and is willing to train a suitable candidate. Josh Smith, Beverage Machine's waterjet technician, says that the impact on today's labor problem started years ago when schools did away with shop programs and put the focus on college prep. He's worked for the company for 16 years, and his dad has been the plant manager for 25 years. He says, "When went to school, the perception was that JVS [joint vocational school] was where the stoners and illiterates went and that everyone who can think goes to college." He says that in five years everyone in the industry will be retiring, and there's going to be a shortage of skilled labor. He adds that the industry has to reach students when they are 11 or 12 to show them that jobs in manufacturing are cool and innovative. To that end, he has started "ThinkSpark," a grassroots movement to create a foundation in Lorain County to inspire and mentor youth to consider careers in manufacturing, to partner with schools and connect children with technical programs, to develop a makerspace for youth in the program, and to create a robotic competition similar to AWT's RoboBots that takes place every

April at Lakeland Community College. John Geiger relates that the manufacturing industry in the area is healthy, but that his biggest challenge, which is the same for all manufacturers, is finding skilled labor or even unskilled labor who are interested in technical training. Recently, he met with representatives from Lorain County Community College about bringing students in

for an apprenticeship training program. From Founder John Geiger to his son, John Geiger, a machinist, to his son, John Geiger, a history major and sales specialist, to his son, John, aka Jake, Geiger, a business management major, the company has stayed in the hands of this capable family for four generations. John says about his business, "There is enough domestic need, and our niche gives us enough work. China can't serve these industries because customers have a part dependency and need it today." He shares, "I get satisfaction in seeing what we create every day. It's a tangible result." His son, Jake, adds, "It's rewarding to have a part come in and see the finished part leave the shop." As Josh Smith sums up, "What sets John apart is that he can see the greater good and a need. He sees what we can do for the next generation. It's not about making money. It's about family." Gina M. 





Hunger is pervasive in many Cleveland neighborhoods, including Collinwood. Despite being in the footprint of the Greater Cleveland Food Bank, the Salvation Army and multiple faith-based food pantries, one in five people in Northeast Ohio is food insecure, meaning they do not know where their next meal comes from

Little Free Pantries including 'Give Box CLE' won't fix this staggering statistic, but together we can positively impact the quality of life for our neighbors. 

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School board to revisit building plan The District has built and substantially by CMSD NEWS BUREAU

Acting on an independent watchdog's recommendation, the Cleveland Board of Education will consider revising its master plan for building and renovating schools. It has been four years since the plan was

last amended and six years since the District began assembling the data used to modify the document.

The Bond Accountability Commission, which was created for the specific purpose of monitoring the ongoing modernization program, has called for an "extensive reexamination" of the plan based on current neighborhood population and enrollment patterns, changes in academic programming and rising construction costs. (Read the BAC report here.)

More recently, the state drastically limited reimbursement for Cleveland's school construction program. The policy changes could force the District to absorb millions of dollars in additional expenses.

Before considering revisions, the District will seek direction from the public. Community meetings will begin June 5. The meeting schedule and other information can be found at clevelandmetroschools. org/buildingplan.

"We support the Bond Accountability Commission's recommendation," District CEO Eric Gordon said. "It's logical to reevaluate the plan under current conditions, and keeping with past practice, we want to ask for guidance from our families and other stakeholders."

renovated more than 40 buildings since the program began in 2002. Work is well under way on seven PreK-8 buildings and construction of two high schools is set to

In 2014, voters overwhelmingly approved a \$200 million bond issue to help fund the remainder of the program. Plans, based on community input, called for building 20 to 22 schools and remodeling 20 to 23 schools.

The state contributes slightly more than \$2 for every \$1 in local funds spent for construction and substantial renovation.

But in an abrupt break from 16 years of practice in Cleveland, the Ohio Facilities Construction Commission has decided to virtually eliminate allowances made for the regional market's higher building costs. The OFCC now wants to hold all districts in the state -- urban, suburban or rural -- to a maximum contribution of \$255 per

The last time the OFCC spent \$255 per square foot for construction in Cleveland was in 2008. The commission is currently paying about \$285 a square foot.

Chief Operating Officer Patrick Zohn said that under the change, CMSD would have to pay an extra \$20 million for the eight schools to be built in the next segment of the program.

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
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
