Grand Opening of Goodwill Outlet store in Collinwood

Grand Opening of Goodwill Outlet Store Unites Greater Collinwood, Cleveland, OH--Greater Collinwood Development Corporation joined Councilman Anthony Hairston and Goodwill Industries of Greater Cleveland Thursday morning, July 25, for the Grand Opening and ribbon cutting ceremony at the new Goodwill Outlet Store, located at East 179th Street and St. Clair Avenue, Cleveland.

The morning was bright for the momentous ribbon-cutting event. The ceremony speaks to the collaboration between the

Councilman's Office, GCDC and social enterprises investing in Greater Collinwood neighborhood.

"We have a great relationship with Goodwill Industries and will be working with them a lot in the future for joint programming," **GCDC** says Director Business Development and Operations Cynthia Brookins.

"It was great to

see such a long line of residents supporting the Outlet's opening in Collinwood."

Goodwill officials met with the Councilman and GCDC staff after the event to tour the facility where merchandise is cycled by the hour and shoppers can enjoy deep bargains and quality merchandise. Items

are priced at \$1.39/lb while large items such as furniture and select showcase items are priced individually.

"Goodwill Outlet Stores represent a winwin for the community," says Goodwill President and CEO Anne Richards. "Shoppers get another chance at merchandise, and every item that is sold in the Outlet Store is another item that is kept out of a landfill."

"You might call it the ultimate recycling program, with the added benefit of fueling job readiness and placement programs - something every Goodwill Store does," says Richards.

The Outlet Store is the second one of its kind for Goodwill Industries of Greater Cleveland and East Central Ohio. It is expected to be a strong complement to the 11 other Cleveland area stores.

Goodwill Industries of Greater Cleveland and East Central Ohio, Inc. works closely with other non-profit agencies as well as community businesses to prepare people for a variety of stable career options and in turn, a more productive and sustainable way of life.

The construction work at Mark Tromba playground, in spite of the rain, has gone very well. We are planning on an official reopening of the park sometime in the middle to late August. This \$1.5 million project was long overdue and will put Tromba on the same level as many suburban facilities. This park is special to me for I myself swam at Tromba Pool as a teen and I am looking forward to the project being completed. Watch for the re-dedication announcement.

Our friends at the Cleveland MetroParks contacted my office to let me know that they are still looking for SEASONAL HELP at Wildwood Marina and Concession Stand. If you know of anyone interested in seasonal and part-time work with the MetroParks. Contact them at (216).635.3200, or send an email to generalinfo@ clevelandmetroparks.com

MetroParks also mentioned to me that they are not getting the customers they thought they would get at the Wildwood Concession stand and carry-out. They spent a considerable amount of money in renovating the inside for the sole purpose of being able to prepare hot food and carry-out items. You have heard me say many times in the past when it comes to neighborhood businesses and venues, "if you don't use - we will lose it!" I lobbied long and hard to get MetroPaks to expand their offerings at the Wildwood concession stand. However, if our residents and park goers do not patronize the stands at both Wildwood and Euclid Beach they could close next year. This was be counterproductive for the redevelopment of our lakefront parks. Please support our friends and partners

at Cleveland MetroParks. Work is well underway on the East 185th Street /Marcella Road storm sewer project. This \$15 million project will run throughout the year and into the next. This is a result of the City of Cleveland's Division of Water Pollution Control, (WPC) effort to address the ongoing and severe basement flooding we had experienced in the East 185th Street and Lakeshore Boulevard areas. Please be careful, for your sake and that of the construction workers, while driving through these areas.

The City's Division of Park Maintenance is finally getting caught up on grass cutting at abandoned lots and properties throughout the city as a result of the extremely wet spring. If there is a property on your street with high grass over 8" please call it into the Mayor's Action Center at (216) 664-2900.

Work on the relocation of Walgreens at 16100 Lakeshore Boulevard has begun in earnest. They have indicated that they will have this open and operational by September. This is one of those corporate decisions which is hard to understand. Nonetheless it was critical to have a pharmacy in our community at that location

due to the large number of seniors nearby who

are highly dependent upon Walgreens for their

pharmacy needs. Let's hope this decision works

for the best interest of our community. We are



15th Annual, Remembering the Sights and Sounds of Euclid Beach





September of this year will mark 50 years since Cleveland's beloved amusement park, Euclid Beach Park closed forever. For 74 seasons it operated on the shore of Lake Erie in Cleveland's Collinwood/Nottingham neighborhood. Although many were saddened by the amusement park's closing, this year's event sponsored by Euclid Beach Park Now in partnership with Cleveland Metroparks, and made possible by a grant from Cuyahoga Arts and Culture, celebrates 50 Years of Fond Memories. To help rekindle memories of the grand amusement park, Euclid Beach Park Now has produced photo posters of the individual rides and attractions with descriptive narrative. These will be placed throughout the park as near as possible to where the ride and attraction once stood. One can take a self-guided tour or tag along on one of the guided tours, led by a Euclid Beach Park Historian relating more park history. There will also be displays of park memorabilia. The Rocket Ship Car and Thriller Car will be present, offering rides out to Lake Shore Boulevard, under the old arch entrance and over the bridge was once part of the Turnpike ride which remains between the two high rise apartment buildings.

New Euclid Beach Park T-shirts and sweatshirts paying homage to the amusement park will be available for purchase, including a new design "Celebrating 50 Years of Fond Memories. DVD's of park history will be for sale as will CD's of the three band organs that were at the park. Euclid Beach Park Now's own book published by Arcadia Publishing will also be available.

Food will be available via Swensons food truck, also Euclid Beach Park popcorn and candy kisses from the Humphrey Company. Weber's Premium will be on site dispensing frozen custard and malts we enjoyed in the basement of the Higbee De-

Besides the photo posters of rides and attractions, there will be some Euclid Beach Park Memorabilia on display. As in years pass there will be an antique car show, The Cars We Drove To Euclid Beach Park. The date for the event, Sunday, September 29, 1:00 pm - 5:00 pm, rain or shine, free admission and free parking. A series called "Hides," for instance, uses 81/2 x 11 pieces of hand-made felt – sort of like animal skin but sort of not - to fuse an individual's unique pattern and texture with the chosen pattern and texture we lay on top of it. The result is colorful and temptingly strokeable. (But I don't think you're meant to stroke them.)

Since earning his MFA from Ohio University in 2015, Greg has worked with community arts organizations giving workshops on felt making, mask making, and hand quilting. He has presented his work at the SculptureX Symposium in Columbus, Radical Philosophy Conference in Long Island, Mid-Atlantic LGBTQA Conference in Bloomsburg, PA, and Open Engagement in Oakland. Outstanding Collection of African-American Art at Framed Gallery

Stacey's gallery was inspiring right from opening day for the strength and variety of the work – which comes from African-American artists all over the country. Lately she has been showing some particularly interesting collections.

Hampton R. Olfus Jr. of Washington, DC, has exhibited nationally and interna-

tionally. His work runs a fascinating range from African to Native American and European, reflecting aspects of the Gullah culture of the coastal Carolinas and Georgia, where a unique creole language developed, with links to the Krio language of West Africa and a number of West Indian creole tongues.

Michael Gibson's work is fascinating in another way; he creates

3-D reality with a pencil. Charles Smith creates finely detailed sgrafitto pots with contrasting images, patterns, and textures. Jerry Prettyman produces bold and colorful paintings and drawings from his impressions of Jazz and Blues musicians.

The sand is clean – Metroparks is taking good care of us. There's a swimming area for kids, and a play area for kids, and food for the family at the new take-out restaurant/snack bar (I've read the menu and it sounds too delicious to be healthy – but food you eat at the beach has no calories.) And it's right here. Thank you, Councilman Polensek. I first wrote about bringing back a concession stand in 2012 – good things come to those who wait – but the councilman has been on the case much longer.



Fiddles at the Market

The Coit Road Farmers' Market, that is where there is usually music of one sort or another, most often guitars. Sometimes Pat with her violin students.
