Bill Azman proprietor of Azman Quality Meats on E 200th Street in Euclid, Ohio won both the Best of Fest Jury Award and the People's Choice Award. Bill said "I was so busy it didn't hear the announcement that we had won. We sold out of blood and rice sausage which is typically served in the fall and winter months."

The party continues at the Polka Hall of Fame's three-day polka music festival, Thanksgiving weekend, November 28, 29 and 30, 2019, at Cleveland's Downtown Marriott Hotel. As winner of the People's Choice, Bill Azman's prize sausages will be served.



What a great September - it is hard to believe it's Fall already and you would never know We all know what is coming, though, so let's get ahead of the curve. Enjoy the Autumn

but at the same time get prepared for the Winter ahead. If you have any potholes or road issues please turn them in NOW. No streets in the neighborhood should have road deficiencies as we move into the winter months. Please be proactive. To report road issues, streetlights out, housing issues, etc., please call them into the City Hotline number at "3-1-1"; just as you would call 9-1-1 for a Police emergency, or 2-1-1 for County Assistance, this number is the new go-to for City complaints.

I hope you all have noticed that there are new LED streetlights going up throughout our ward. As of this writing our ward is about 95% complete according to the City. There were two test wards completed, one east and one west. We were the third ward to receive the new lights due to the fact that our community has the largest customer base of Cleveland Public Power. We have experienced some issues on streets where one side of the street is lit too bright and the other side is too dark. If you are experiencing any problems as a result of the new LED lights installation. Please call CPP Customer Service at (216) 664-4600. In addition, if there are tree branches obstructing the streetlights please call that in as well. We have waited a long time for the new lighting to be installed and we want to make sure that it is having the positive impact on our neighborhood streets.

I want to thank all the folks who came to the presentation at the Recreation Center regarding the Cleveland MetroParks plans for our lakefront which includes Euclid Beach, Villa Angela and Wildwood Marina on September 11th. There is no doubt that our three parks are playing a major role in bringing people down to the lakefront and providing additional recreational opportunities. Work on the East 185th Street / Marcella Road storm sewer project is going strong. In fact, they are now working around the clock on the project in an effort to speed up completion and to enhance the tunnel boring, which is taking place far below street level. Local Sausage Scores Again

At the 16th Annual Slovenian Sausage Festival, Azman Quality Meats of Euclid earned the rare honor of winning both the Best of Fest Jury Award and the People's Choice Award. Raddell's Sausage Shop scored runner-up in both categories. The event was hosted by the National Cleveland-Style Polka Hall of Fame in September, at the SNPJ Farm in Kirtland

More than 1,300 hungry musiclovers enjoyed eight hours of polka music and savory sausages. Fifty musicians and accordionists, including Canada's Polka King Walter Ostanek, volunteered their services at the fundraiser for the Polka Hall of Fame. Slovenian sausage is made with pork, often accented with garlic, and then cured and smoked. Nearly 2,000 sausages were pur-

chased at the event. The National Cleveland-Style Polka Hall of Fame celebrates the style of American dance music that emerged from the city's neighborhoods and became a national sensation, with America's Polka King Frank Yankovic, in the decades after World War II. 





solidating some schools and closing some buildings. The goal is to keep the pledge, included in The Cleveland Plan, to make quality education available to every neighborhood.

CMSD has more than 100 schools, and enrollment in a majority of the schools is below capacity. As a result, programs and resources are stretched. The challenges are not limited to the District; charter and private schools are affected, too.

The school board and the Bond Accountability Commission recommended that CMSD revisit a five-year-old building plan based on current neighborhood population and enrollment patterns, changes in academic programming and rising construction costs. The commission is an independent watchdog created to monitor an ongoing modernization program that the District is paying for with state funds and a local bond issue.

State of the Schools highlights momentum

Cleveland's public schools have a long way to go but are gathering momentum, CEO Eric Gordon said Sept. 26 in the annual State of the Schools address.

Speaking to a packed ballroom at the Renaissance Cleveland Hotel, Gordon repeated a theme sounded after a new state report card raised CMSD's overall grade from an F to a D. He has said the District will not celebrate a D but will celebrate the report card's many signs of significant progress.

In his speech, hosted by the City Club, Gordon described that progress by using references to the laws of the 17th Century physicist and mathematician Isaac Newton. The CEO said the District had, with strong community support, moved from a state of rest to motion.

"In Newton's terms, the mass that is the Cleveland Metropolitan School District is not only accelerating its progress, but it is gaining momentum," he said.

Gordon cited highlights from the report card, including improvement in K-3 literacy, overall test scores and the graduation rate, which has reached the latest in a series of record highs for the District. CMSD's growth in those categories outpaced that of most school districts in the state. At times, he punctuated sentences with "That's momentum."

The CEO also peeled back the label of the letter grade to reveal complex learning widely found in "joyful, adventurous classrooms."

He put faces and names on students and educators who successfully made synthetic fuel for a car, developed an app for the Northern Ohio chapter of the Federal Bar Association, converted and operate school bus that now serves as a food truck, wrote and produced a powerful play about gun violence, performed community service featured in a current Cleveland History Center exhibit and more.

"One needs only to visit a classroom in the Cleveland Metropolitan School District to see and feel the difference, to understand what momentum is, what it looks like in action and what impact these changes are having on the way Cleveland's kids think, learn and act," Gordon said.

Jonah Medina, a senior at the John Marshall School of Information Technology, helped create the app and was present for the State of the Schools address. The project helped him prepare for a career in software development that he hopes to study for at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

"It was a great experience," he said. "It's not every day a student gets to make something of that importance."

The CEO praised Mayor Frank G. Jackson and the community for plucking the schools from the brink of academic emergency and bankruptcy.

The comeback began with broad support for The Cleveland Plan, a sweeping set of customized reforms that were written into state law in 2012. Gordon also pointed to voter approval and renewal of an operating levy that made the reforms possible and passage of a bond issue that continued construction and renovation of school build-

Most recently, the community rallied to raise money for Say Yes to Education, a 25-year initiative that funds scholarships for CMSD graduates and support services to help students and families overcome barriers to success.

The program, which was announced in January, is widely seen as finishing a path that can nurture and guide students from high-quality preschool to a choice of school options to college and career. But Gordon said the District will need continued support from the public to keep going.

"To the people in this room and across this community, whose vision and unwavering support brought us here, I am happy to report that the state of our schools is stronger and measurably better than at any time in recent history," he said. "Each of you helped put the District in motion. So, now let's accelerate the gains we are seeing. Let's build on that momentum."

After the speech, the CEO fielded questions from audience members, including a number of students. About 250 students were present, thanks to table sponsors.

Students asked about the future of high schools that will be the focus of planning meetings that start Saturday and the potential for arts programs that will be addressed in a District arts plan. They asked about help for students who are victims of violence in the community or get in trouble that students with more resources could easily address. He said the District's social and emotional learning program and Say Yes provide such assistance.

One student asked what single change Gordon would make if he could wave a magic wand. He said it would be to remove the false perception of "CMSD stink" perpetuated by people who believe nothing good ever happens in the Cleveland schools.

"They don't know you," he replied. "They don't know all of kids who are doing amazing things in our classrooms and all the educators who are doing amazing things in our classrooms."

The program, now in its third year, focuses on increasing women and minorities in law enforcement and public safety fields to reflect the communities being served. CPR certification and the capstone project proved to be the most rewarding aspects of the summer program. At only 15, Aiyanna is proud to be equipped with the skills necessary to save a life. For her capstone, she researched the impact of poverty within the African American community and resources available to help those in need. This project deeply impacted her, as she acknowledged having friends who face economic hardships. Reflecting on the project, Aiyanna said, "Even being young, I have a voice and can make a positive





CLEVELAND –Mayor Frank G. Jackson along with Michael Cox, Director of Public Works and Councilman Michael Polensek (Ward 8) joined city dignitaries and residents on Sept. 21 for a ribbon cutting ceremony to commemorate the renovation of Mark Tromba Park.

"Mark Tromba Park is a neighborhood park," said Mayor Jackson. "This community owns this park emotionally and physically. It is good for the community."

The \$1.2 million renovation of the Collinwood neighborhood park includes a new splash pad, playgrounds with swings, two basketball courts and a tennis court. Visitors can also utilize new amenities including a drinking fountain, game tables, benches and waste receptacles. Other renovations consist of expanded parking to accommodate 26 vehicles, lighting, fencing repairs and the removal of tall perimeter

fences to create a more welcoming environment.

In an effort to support the sustainable development of the city, the park now provides 33 percent more green space in the overall design. The park will also feature a public art sculpture by Cleveland artist Charlotte Lees, located at the confluence of the park's walk ways.

About Mark Tromba

Mark Tromba was a first generation immigrant from Italy. At the age of six he came to America with his parents and family. After completing high school Mr. Tromba served in the U.S. Army during World War 2 and upon his return he settled in the Collinwood neighborhood working days at his job and volunteering his time with the Collinwood Booster Club and, in the evenings, helped start Cleveland's Little League Baseball program






